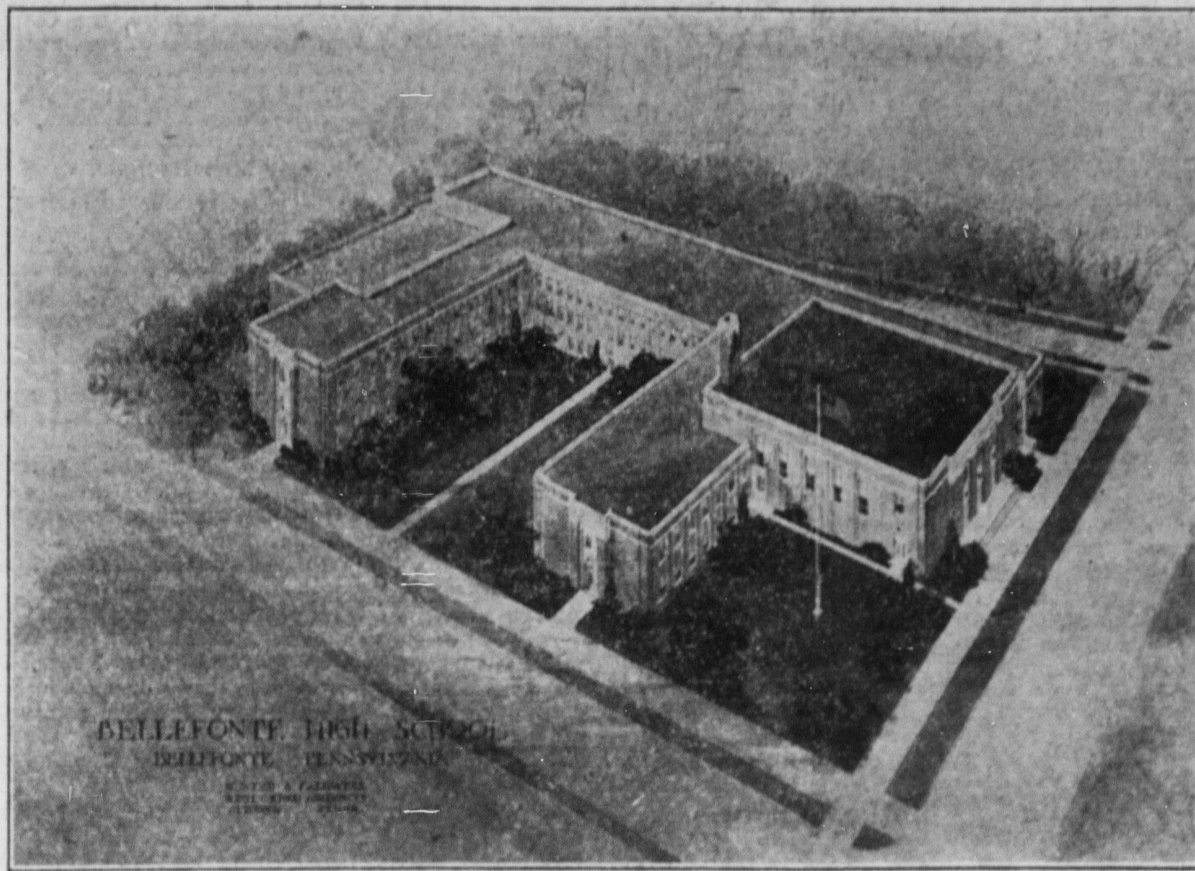

Definite awarding of the contract was based on a report by the Building Corporation's Solicitor, John G. Love, to the effect that a Philadelphia bonding house had sold more than \$300,000 of a \$350,000 bond issue and could guarantee sale of the remainder upon receiving an expert opinion upon the legality of the bonds.

The corporation voted to furnish the expert opinion if it became necessary to do so. The possibility that such an opinion might not be needed hinged upon the action of the State Senate and Governor James yesterday, on the Bellefonte School Aid Bill, which has been wending a weary way through the legislature for many weeks. Final passage of this bill, it was believed in some quarters, might eliminate the necessity for an expert opinion on the bonds.

In any event, it was pointed out, the school district is assured that the money will be available upon presentation of a legal opinion, which also is assured. Acting upon these positive assurances, the corporation voted to instruct contractors to begin fulfilling their duties. The contracts call for the completion of

the building within one year after work is begun, which would set the date for completion at June 1, 1942, in time for the 1942 fall opening.

Had the contracts not been awarded Tuesday, and if no action had been taken by them by tomorrow, May 30, the contracts would have become void, insofar as the amount specified for the work were concerned. With the cost of building materials soaring daily, and with defense priorities making it impossible to obtain many materials, much delay and extra cost would have been involved.

Immediately after the session contractors were notified by telegram that they could proceed at once. A review of the costs involved in the construction of the building revealed a total estimated cost of \$451,000, of which \$381,000 represents the cost of actual construction. Added to that figure are a \$25,000 "token" payment for the site of the building; \$22,500 for architectural fees; \$6,500 for legal fees, printing and sale of bonds, recording mortgage and incidental expenses, and \$14,000 for interest payments on the bond issue during the year the building is under construction.

To offset that expense the corporation will have \$350,000 from the sale of bonds; \$84,000 from the fire insurance fund, and a \$14,000 ap-
