New Cable Line To Improve Service

Replacement of open wire telephone lines from Pleasant Gap to Old Fort near Centre Hall, with storm-resisting telephone cable is the objective of construction work by the Bell Telephone Company which is now under way. The improvement, which will cost more than \$23,000, will provide an all-weather route from Bellefonte to Centre Hall.

Jesse H. Caum, manager for the Bell Company, said that the work of setting new poles is nearing completion. The pole line will be adjacent to the Pleasant Gap-Centre Hall highway for part of the distance and then along a secondary highway through the town of Centre Hall.

The company plans to place nearly five miles of aerial cable from the end of the present cable at Pleasant Gap to a point at Old Fort, which is a junction point for open wire lines to Spring Mills, Millheim and Lewistown. The new cable will contain facilities for local service along its route as well as for additional circuits between Bellefonte and Centre Hall.
