Words Often Misspelled
Contemptible; observe the ible. Current (a fruit); current (a stream); also circulating. Device (a contrivance); devise (to plan); to bequeath; pronounced de-viz. Evasive (baffling); illusive (unreal); Tallies; observe the two ls. Armistice; tie, not tise.

Word Study
"Use a word three times and it is yours." Let us increase our vocabulary by mastering one word each day. Words for this lesson: DISCREPANCY; state of being contrary or different. "There was a marked discrepancy between their stories."

Words Often Mispronounced
Penalize. Pronounce pe-nal-iz, e as in me, a as in unstressed, i as in ice, accent first syllable. The first syllable is not pronounced.

OPPORTUNE; timely. "His appearance was most opportune."
IMPUGN; to attack by words or arguments; to contradict. "The truth hereof I will not rashly impugn, or overboldly affirm."

Household Scrapbook
To Mend Glass
Glass may be mended with a cement made by dissolving white shellac in enough alcohol to make a mixture of the consistency of molasses.

Black Heads
An excellent wash for black heads can be made with the following ingredients: 36 grains of sub-carbonate of soda, 8 ounces of distilled water, and 6 drams of essence of roses.

Tarnished Rhinestone Pins
Set the tarnished rhinestone pins and buckles in gasoline for about fifteen minutes, then polish with a flannel cloth, and they will look like new.

Good Riddance
The furnace is a splendid place for those soiled wet wrappings and greasy ice cream boxes. In two minutes they can be burned, and all attraction to flies, roaches, and summer bugs is eliminated.

Hardened Paint Brushes
Brushes on which paint has been allowed to harden often prove difficult to clean. Heat some vinegar to the boiling point and soak the brushes for twenty minutes.

For Sour Milk Recipes
Two tablespoonfuls of lemon juice added to one cup of sweet milk soured it to the acidity desired for sour milk recipes.

Dish Washing
It is always the best plan to pour boiling water over the dishes after washing. This not only removes all the suds, but makes the dishes much easier to dry.

Half a Lemon
If it is necessary to use only half a lemon in a recipe, don't discard the other half. Place it in a dish, cut side down, and put into the refrigerator. It will keep until you find a use for it.

Dustless Dust Cloth
Dip clean dust cloths into a mixture of 2 tablespoonfuls of linseed or vegetable oil and 1 pint of gasoline or benzine. Hang the cloth outside in the shade to dry before using.

Outside Cooking
Before cooking anything over an open fire out of doors, rub the outside of the pans with soap and this will prevent soot from adhering to them.
