

material was cut for the January quota and 170 pounds of yarn was converted into sweaters and mufflers, in addition to 10 pounds of yarn made into shawls.

In the March quota, 945 yards of material was cut; 125 pounds of yarn was knitted into sweaters and mufflers and 15 pounds of shawl yarn were used. Five pounds of sock yarn also was in the shipment.

Mrs. Walker reports that there is on hand, in addition to the items Men's Sweaters that have been shipped, 5 finished Men's Socks sweaters. Twenty-three others are Mufflers to be made, and 36 sweaters, 8 cro- Women's Sweaters cheted shawls, 6 pairs of socks and 15 mufflers are now being made.
