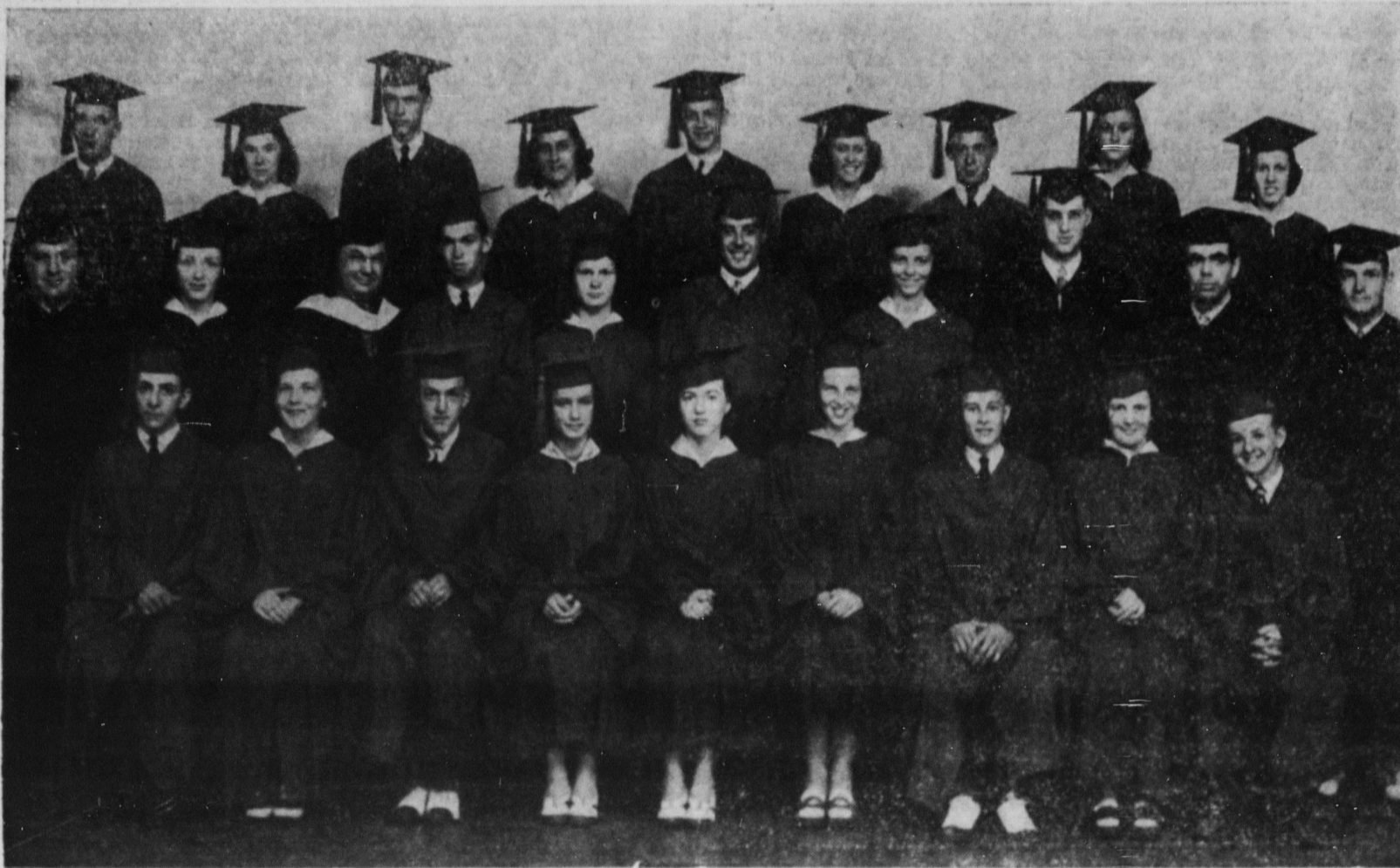

(Continued from Page 1) material was cut for the January quota and 170 pounds of yarn was converted into sweaters and mufflers, in addition to 10 pounds of yarn made into shawls. In the March quota, 945 yards of material was cut; 123 pounds of yarn was knitted into sweaters and mufflers and 15 pounds of shawl yarn were used. Five pounds of sock yarn also was in the shipment. Mrs. Walker reports that there is on hand, in addition to the items that have been shipped, 5 finished sweaters, twenty-three others are to be made, and 36 sweaters, 8 crocheted shawls, 6 pairs of socks and 15 mufflers are now being made. Break Ground For School

(Continued from page one) R. C. Blaney, chairman of the board's building committee, acted as master of ceremonies. Following an invocation by the Rev. C. E. Arnold, pastor of St. John's Lutheran church, Mr. Blaney introduced Miss Ella Levy, oldest retired teacher in Bellefonte; Miss Marion Volynch, secretary of the school board; John G. Love, building corporation attorney; Franklin B. Schad, board member; Mahlon K. Robb, president of the corporation; Hays W. Matern, Jr., board treasurer; J. Bossart DeHaas, board member; Lewis R. Lenhart, secretary-treasurer of the corporation; Newell B. Long, corporation member; William H. Brouse, board and corporation member; Musser W. Gettig, board attorney, and F. Glenn Rogers, county superintendent of schools. The first speaker, Earl K. Stock, supervising principal of schools, cautioned against the danger of mistaking a new building for an educational program. He said that an adequate building is necessary and important, but that it does not in itself comprise a royal road to learning. Pupils, parents, teachers, and citizens of the town will have to cooperate in improving the educational program when the building is complete, he declared. "We hope to found and promote here an educational program to equip our boys and girls for life and living as well as any school in the land," the speaker concluded. O. F. Sollenberger, principal of the high school, declared that the proposed new building is a challenge to teachers, pupils and the community. He predicted that when the new structure is completed, some courses which have outlived their usefulness will be dropped, and new and vital ones will be added. "Our educational program will be revised to meet modern needs," he declared. We hope to "do things" better; to have more activities, to create more interest in school work and to be more helpful to pupils, Mr. Sollenberger added. Judge Ivan Walker reviewed briefly the history of the Bellefonte schools and traced their almost phenomenal growth. He commended the perseverance of those who have led the struggle for the past two years to complete the building program. Judge Walker, referring to the fact that the order in most countries today is destruction, rather than construction, declared that such order is only temporary. "We're building for the future—we're beginning a school plant to be utilized in building up the mental, physical and moral capacities of the future citizens of this community." Judge Walker asked the citizens to get behind the building project to see that it is completed as soon as possible. The final speaker was Horace J. Hartranft, president of the board, the text of whose address is given in full elsewhere in this issue. Concluding his brief address, Mr. Hartranft took the "golden" shovel, specially made for the occasion and presented by the Titan Metal Company, and with the words: "Let us here erect a building which is a credit to our town, a thing of beauty and a thing of usefulness, a building which will provide an education for any boy or girl who desires to come," he turned the first spadeful of earth. The second spadeful was turned by Miss Mary Grace Hartsock, president of the senior class. Mr. Hartranft then presented the shovel to James Thompson, president of the Student Senate, with the words: "And now through you, Mr. President of the Student Council, it is the desire of the Board of Directors to present this spadeful to the student body. We trust it will fill a prominent niche in the new building, so that all who see it may be reminded of the large sacrifice the citizens of this community are willing to make to give to them an opportunity for an education." Accepting the gift, Mr. Thompson, speaking for the student body, gave assurance that the spadeful would be cherished as a symbol of all the benefits pupils of the school will reap.
