

Over 400 Pupils Pass School Test

Among 405 pupils in the county who passed examinations required of non-residents for high school entrance, four from the Milesburg schools are listed among the twenty highest grades received in the tests, it was reported yesterday by County Superintendent of Schools F. Glenn Rogers.

For a number of years Milesburg pupils have taken the lion's share of honors among the twenty highest grades, records show.

Lemont schools were second highest, with three pupils listed in the honor group. Next was the North Philadelphia school, with 2 pupils. TRAINING SHIP OPEN TO BOYS AND YOUNG MEN

The American Nautical Academy, Washington, D. C., has announced that boys and young men between the ages of 10 and 21 years will be allowed to secure practical nautical experience on board a training ship of the Academy within the period from June 15 to October 1, 1941.

The young men may remain on board ship for the entire summer period, or for any shorter time they may wish, but not for less than one month.

Students who enter for any period less than the full summer course will receive instruction only in those subjects being taught, while the student is on board ship.

The summer course has been designed for young men interested in obtaining a knowledge of nautical subjects pertaining to yachting, military and naval drills and the handling of small boats.

There is no charge for instruction or for living quarters on board ship. The only required expense is for meals, which are 49 cents. Three meals are served daily.

There is no tuition charge for any of the courses offered by the Academy, and no obligation for future service of any kind is incurred by the young men.

On Sundays the cadets will be allowed to attend divine services at the churches of their respective denominations on shore. While on board ship cadets will receive first aid treatment when necessary.

This is the twelfth annual summer course offered by the Academy and will be under the personal supervision of the Captain Commandant of the Academy who will be in command of the vessel.

While on board ship the students will follow the regular daily ship routine, and will be given practical instruction in nautical subjects, including seamanship (ship's work)—many of the duties on board ship are performed by the cadets as part of their training—signaling, rowing, handling and the use of motors, boats, life-saving, military and naval drills, use of distress signals, life buoys, first aid, the compass, log and lead, ground tackle, international Morse code, blinker, duties of look-outs and the duties of the watch on deck.

The summer course will be conducted on board the Training Ship "Marsala."

It was reported that the Rochester and Pittsburgh Coal Company is now making a survey of the tract, plotting the positions of the various cottage sites, in the territory involved in the contemplated transaction there are 18 cottages, including one owned by the Coal Company.
