# **Bills Outline Procedure for Birth Records**

Expect Early Enactment of Law to Aid In Establishing Facts of Births WOULD ELIMINATE

PRESENT CONFUSION Orphans' Courts Would Pass on Merits of Peti-

tions; Fee Fixed \$2.50

Either one of two bills of almost dentical nature now wending their way through the State Legislature in Harrisburg, will, if passed, create a fixed and legal procedure for recording the births of those persons whose births are not now in public records, or whose records are incorrect or inaccurate. The two bills are: House Bill No.

1543, and Senate Bill No. 9. Legislators claim there is little difference between the two. The advent of social security, old age pensions, and the national defense program have made birth

records almost a prime necessity to every citizen. Older persons often find it practically impossible to establish with certainty the facts of their births. Prior to 1893 no public birth ecords were kept. From 1893 to 1906 the Orphans' Courts of the various counties kept birth records. Since
