Philipsburg Bakery Strike Ends Saturday

The three-day strike of employees of Morningstar Bakery, Philipsburg, ended Saturday afternoon when striking workers were granted a five cents hourly wage increase.

Negotiators reached an agreement Saturday afternoon when members of the union, affiliated with the American Federation of Labor, agreed to the five cents wage increase.

The bakerymen went out on strike Thursday night when their demands of a ten cent hourly wage boost were not met by the company.

Bread was being produced at the daily rate of 25,000 loaves a day, normal production. Workers went back on their jobs for the first time since Thursday when production began yesterday morning at 3 o'clock.

Paid vacations were also granted the workers this year by the bakery.

No outbreaks marked this year's walk-out although pickets were on duty during the three days that the plant was out on strike.

\$153 Collected For Fireworks Display

School Excavation Continues Steadily

Excavation work at the Bellefonte High School site is continuing at a steady pace, and rough excavation for the class room section along Linn street, and the gymnasium along Spring street have been completed.

The shovel is now engaged in the most difficult part of its task—removing the old concrete foundations for the boiler room section. The foundations were shattered with dynamite, and the shovel is now completing demolition.

Meanwhile crews of workmen are digging footings for the gymnasium and class room sections. Yesterday several large trees on the Lamb street side were removed to make way for the new building. A West Penn Power Company truck and line crew aided in felling the trees.

During the excavation last week workmen uncovered several old glass bottles which are believed to have some value as antiques. They were described as being of the general appearance of soft drink bottles, with the exception that their bottoms were rounded.
