Red Cross Nurse Submits Report

Diphtheria Immunization Program Completed in Local Schools

Mrs. Joseph A. Parrish, nursing activities chairman of the Bellefonte Chapter, American Red Cross, called a session of the committee recently to meet with Miss Catherine Nardi, nursing consultant, Red Cross, Washington, D. C.

Several members of the executive board were present and discussions on the policies and procedures for a nursing activities committee were held. Miss Nardi gave some excellent suggestions which the committee hopes to be able to adopt.

The quarterly report of Miss Bertha Rimmer, Red Cross Nurse for this area follows: maternity service, pre-natal, post-partum and newborn, 69 visits; morbidity service, non-communicable, 296 visits; crippled children's service, 1; health service, infant school, 24 visits; non-classified service, 5 visits; social service, 1 visit; visits made to schools, 14, or a total of 410 visits.

Special projects were diphtheria immunization in Spring Township schools and St. John's Parochial school. Miss Rimmer also assisted Miss Keichline with the immunization program in Bellefonte schools.

Diphtheria serum was furnished by the Pennsylvania State Department of Health and Miss Slage, State Health Nurse, assisted with the work. A total of 177 pre-school and school-age children were given the

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serum. Dr. Parrish donated his services for the Spring Township and Parochial schools.

Six school children had eye examinations and were fitted with glasses, four pairs of glasses being purchased by the Bellefonte Elks Club and the other two being provided by the Associated Charities.

Miss Rimmer attended a meeting of the district No. 5 Pennsylvania Nurses Association which was held at Huntingdon. She has made plans to leave for her vacation July 7 and will return to duty August 4. Miss Mary Locke, of Bellefonte, will carry on the nursing service during that time. Pine Grove Mills Native Rounds Out Fifty Active Years in Ministry

Officiating at the morning service in St. John's Lutheran church, at Gallitzin, Sunday, Rev. Wilton Clyde Dunlap, D.D., Ph.D., pastor of the church for seven years, completed a half century of active ministry and formally announced his retirement.

It was an impressive morning for the minister, his wife and the congregation, and all experienced sadness at the parting. Dr. and Mrs. Dunlap were presented with a basket of choice flowers and a substantial cash gift as token of the high appreciation in which they are held by that congregation.

The Rev. Dr. Dunlap is very proud, and justly so, of the record of St. John's church in the past seven years, as they stand today free of debt, have completely beautified the church edifice inside and

out, and have added a new electric organ. In the seven years there, he took in 48 new members, baptized 33, officiated at eight marriages and conducted eight funeral services.

Dr. Dunlap was born at Pine Grove Mills, Pa., a son of Scott and Lyde (Dunlap) Dunlap, on December 29, 1865. He was twice married, first to Irene Beck, of Half Moon township, who passed away following an operation in a Louisville, Kentucky, hospital. He was married the second time to Miss May Rhone, of Centre Hall, at Newport, Kentucky, by Dr. Matchman.
