New Laws Result of Long Session

(Continued from page one)

by Governor James early in the session were bills:

1-Creating an 11-member state council of defense with the governor as its head, to co-ordinate, the commonwealth's defense activities and gear them with other states and the federal government.

2-Setting up a home defense corps to replace national guardsmen called into a year's training with the regular army.

3-Allow public employees who now enter military service to hold their state or community jobs.

Provision was made for soldiers away from home in army camps to vote by mail in this year's primaries and the general election.

Another bill allows Pennsylvania to enter an interstate compact for the conservation of oil and gas—without the power to regulate production. Passed in the session's final days, the bill went to the governor with virtual assurance of his approval.

Abatement of penalties and interest on unpaid taxes was allowed on an optional basis with separate bills enacted for Pittsburgh and Philadelphia as distinct from the rest of the state.

Aids Anthracite Industry

The Legislature provided four important laws:

1-Making statutory the voluntary quota plan under which production was regulated—by requiring the Department of Commerce to "promulgate" control plans for only those collieries co-operating.

2-Tightening regulations on coal trucks to insure full-weight deliveries.

3-Require strip mining operators to file maps with the Department of Mines which also authorized to tighten its supervision over this form of mining.

4-Amending the public utility law to give the commission additional power to control the use of small trucks used by "independent" miners at their mines.

Vetted by the governor were a half dozen bills including one later signed in revised form bringing commitment of milk under price control of the state milk commission.

James also approved a bill giving the Securities Commission greater supervision over investment brokers and requiring them to register with the commission.

On the Sunday movie question a new law allowed public referenda every four instead of five years but raised from 5 to 20 per cent the number of voters necessary to get the referenda.

Other bills signed by the governor would:

Validate the title to lands and buildings previously sold by boards of school directors at public auction without full compliance with laws authorizing such sales.

Allow school directors and vocational school directors to solicit sealed bids for purchase of material and equipment for national defense education and waive the requirement that such bids be advertised.

Set back the time for opening of trout season from midnight April 15 until 5 a. m.

Authorize city treasurers to execute and perfect deeds for seated lands sold for taxes by their predecessors in office.

Authorize the Highway Department to take over construction and maintenance of bridges and approaches on state highways when designated as essential national defense roads.

Authorize the secretary of property and supplies to give to the federal government visual and radio aviation navigation aids owned by the commonwealth.

Validate the action of third-class cities which built sewers outside their limits and make such sewers lawful parts of the city system.

Require merchants to place weighing and measuring devices in full view of customers.

Give county commissioners in second to eighth-class counties, inclusive, authority to make supplemental appropriations after their budgets have been approved.

Authorize magistrates, justices of the peace or aldermen to fix bail in involuntary manslaughter cases involving automobiles, trolleys or trains.

Give widows and children of a decedent immediate access to a \$500 inheritance exemption without appraisal of the estate where the orphan's court decides the property "is of such nature that its value is apparent or readily ascertainable."

Allow city controllers to appoint additional probate clerks.

Authorize reciprocal agreements with other states for interstate transportation and support of indigent persons.

Define a "daily newspaper" as one published at least five days a week.

Allow policemen who are fined, suspended or discharged the right to a court appeal within 30 days.

Provide that reconditioned oil be sold only in containers specially stamped that it had once been used.

Allow councils in third-class cities to make supplemental appropriations from funds on hand or anticipated revenues.

Permit oil companies to fix the price of gasoline sold in pumps bearing their name or trade mark.
