partnership in Philadelphia before Mr. Landsey came to Bellefonte. After Landsey moved to this locality, he continued to act as Antrim's local solicitor and because of that arrangement the painter frequently was called to this town.

Many of the portraits of former Centre County Judges now hanging in the county Court House were done by Mr. Antrim. In addition he painted portraits of Bellefonte: three Governors, Curtin, Beaver and Hastings, the late A. G. Morris, the late Charles R. Kurtz, and many other prominent citizens. Much of the local painting was done from photographs, but some of his subjects were done from life.

Antrim completed his last work about 10 days before his death. It was a portrait of General George Gordon Meade, Civil War general, for whom Fort Meade, Md., was named. The portrait has been hung at the camp.

Among his other portraits of note were those of the late Bishops Matthew Simpson, Joseph F. Berry and Thomas B. Neely, of the Methodist Church, and six life-size likenesses of Dennis Cardinal Dougherty.

Born in Pemberton, N. J., Mr. Antrim went to Philadelphia as a boy and was graduated in 1880 from the Academy of the Pine Arts. Later he studied in Rome and Brussels.

He was an active member of the Philadelphia Tabernacle Methodist Church and Sunday School, and for many years was a member of this church's board of trustees.

He is survived by his wife, Alice F., two daughters, Miriam and Alva of Philadelphia, and a son, William, of Baltimore.

## Sharp Decrease In Registration

County Loses 1628 Voters Since Last Fall Through Deaths, Movings, Purge

According to registration figures released yesterday by the Centre County Registration Board, the county has lost a total of 1628 qualified voters since the November 1940 registration.

Total registration for the September primaries this year is 23,946, against a total of 25,574 last fall.

The drop in registration is attributed to three factors: deaths, movings, and the yearly purge of voters' lists to strike off the names of electors who have not exercised their franchise in the previous years. Persons purged from the list for non-voting must re-register to regain their right to vote.

During the year the Democratic party, with a total of 11,197 members last fall, and a present total of 10,292, lost 906 members. In the same period the Republican ranks, with 12,973 members last year and present total of 13,268, lost 708 members. There were 404 voters under miscellaneous party-headings last year, and yesterday's total was 389, or a loss of 15.

Registration of voters will be resumed after the Primary election on September 9.

## LEWIS Q. FAWCETT TO OPEN DAIRY STORE HERE

Lewis Q. Fawcett, of Zion, principal of the Walker township schools, Hubersburg, has leased the room at the southern end of Temple Court building, South Allegheny street, Bellefonte, and is having the room made ready for use as a dairy store.

Mr. Fawcett expects to manufacture his own ice cream and will handle a full line of dairy products. He will continue his school duties for the time being.
