TO HOLD EXAM FOR RURAL CARRIER POST

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced that an examination to fill the position of rural carrier at Julian, will be held at State College.

Receipts of applications will close on August 29, 1941.

The date of examination will be stated on admission cards mailed to applicants after the close of receipt of applications, and will be about 15 days after that date. The salary of a rural carrier on a standard route of 30 miles served daily except Sunday is \$1,800 per annum, with an additional \$20 per mile per annum for each mile or major fraction thereof in excess of 30 miles. Certain allowances are also made for the maintenance of equipment. The examination will be open only to citizens who are actually residing in the territory of the post office where the vacancy exists, who have been actually residing there for six

County Receives Fuel Tax Funds

Commissioners, Highway Department in New Agreement on Road Damages

The Centre County Commissioners this week received from the State \$71,000, representing the county's share of liquid fuel tax refunds for 1940 and for the first half of 1941. The funds received are earmarked for road purposes only.

Because of the construction of the new Bellefonte-State College Highway, road damage claims in the county have been especially heavy, and the Commissioners, rather than follow the course of some other counties in making claimants wait until the State refunded the liquid fuels tax money, borrowed a total of \$88,000 to meet claims as presented. The money was borrowed at an interest rate of 2 1/2 per cent.

With deduction of interest payments on the borrowed money, the county still is in debt about \$21,000, but the State refund in January is expected to be large enough to offset that deficit.

All the road damage claims involved were contracted by the former board of Commissioners.

Permanent relief from future heavy road damage claims is practically assured under the terms of a new agreement between the Commissioners and the State Highway Department. In the future the Highway Department will pay one-half of all such claims, and the county will pay the other half. In addition, the county will set the total amount for which the county will be liable on any new road construction.

It is believed the new agreement will result in close control of future damage claims.

Held For Court In Assault Case

Twenty-Year-Old Quarry Worker Pleads Not Guilty at Hearing

Ernest William Schwab, 28, was returned to Clinton county jail to wait court, it was announced after one of two hearings Tuesday morning before Alderman T. Mark Brumgard in Lock Haven.

Schwab, a quarry employe, pleaded not guilty to two charges which connected him with an attempted assault on a former Williamsport woman the evening of August 3.

Chief of Police Martin J. Peters filed the information for both charges, public indecency and assault and battery.

The case is expected to come before the October sessions of criminal court.

The 23-year-old victim of the assault was further identified at the hearing as Mrs. Georgette Hauke, separated from her husband, Carl Lynn Hauke, of Government Place, Williamsport, who has been in the U. S. Army for some time.

Mrs. Hauke was at first identified as Georgetta Welty, a name she began using when she came to Lock Haven to work in a drug store. Her father's address, officials said, is 235 Williams street, Williamsport.

At the hearing, Mrs. Hauke repeated her account of being attacked by Schwab, who, she said, had previously attempted to "date" her, as she passed through mid-city here at twilight.

Schwab had confessed, police said, after a night of questioning immediately after he was arrested the same night of the attack Schwab's residence is 628 Clinton street, Lock Haven.

PENN STATE IS HOST TO 4-H CLUB MEMBERS

With "leadership through practice" their theme, 170 older 4-H Club members are attending the 16th annual Leadership School at the Pennsylvania State College this week. They represent 58 counties.

After registration Sunday the delegates attended their first event, a vesper service in the State College Presbyterian church.

During the week they have had talks, discussions, training in song and recreation leading, practice in planning banquets, campfire programs, picnics, and vesper services, and have participated in nature study, campus tours, assemblies, a picnic and a banquet, a citizenship ceremony, and a candlelight service.

Speakers on their program have been Charles E. Potter of the U. S. Department of Agriculture; William V. Dennis, professor of rural sociology; Dr. Ralph L. Watts, dean emeritus of the School of Agriculture; and J. Martin Fry, assistant director of agricultural extension.

Beginning Wednesday afternoon and continuing until Saturday morning the leadership delegates are assisting the state club leaders with the activities of the 21st annual State Club Week, which is attended by about 1,200 members from nearly all the counties in the state.

Chief activity of Club Week is the competition in the various state-wide jumping contests. Dairy cattle, poultry, swine, vegetables, general livestock, room improvement, foods, and clothing are being judged. There also are contests in flower identification.

The diplomas were awarded by President Ralph D. Hetzel, and Dr. Ben George Graham, superintendent of public schools in Pittsburgh, gave the commencement address.

Last week's commencement was the third held by the College during 1941 and brought the total degrees awarded this year to 1522. One hundred and thirty-five students received degrees at the mid-year commencement in January and 1112 at the regular June exercises.

Nearly two-thirds of the degrees awarded at the summer exercises went to those who completed graduate work. Included in this group were 22 who received the degree of doctor of philosophy.

Three of those enrolled in the regular four-year course were graduated with honors, having attained a scholastic average of 2.40 or better out of the maximum 3.00.

The honor students were Mowrie A. Ebner, of Altoona; Mary Jane Gibson, of DuBois; and Eugene M. Presnky, of Mahanoy City.
