DISEASE CONTROL HELPS TO GROW FINE FLOWERS

Without control, diseases would damage and destroy at least one-third of our flowers, says County Agent R. C. Blaney. Some of the most disease-susceptible flowers, such as hybrid tea roses, would likely produce only about half as many flowers on each bush and, in addition, disease attacks would so weaken the bushes that half of them would be winter-killed.

Black spot, one of the destructive diseases of roses, is caused by a fungus which is unable to make its own food and, therefore, must feed on other plants. The spores of the black spot fungus when in water send out little roots which can grow into a rose leaf and pull out food. For that reason, sprinkling is not the way to water a rose garden; the water should run on the ground.

Since rain and dew cannot be kept off the rose leaves, however, it is necessary to spray or dust rose

bushes each week during the growing season to control black spot. The spray should contain Bordeaux or other forms of copper. Dust usually contains sulfur to act as a fungus deterrent.

When a leaf is covered with either copper or sulfur, the chemical poisons and kills the roots of the fungus spore as they try to enter the covering or outer layer of the leaf. With new leaves being put out all the time, it is necessary to spray or dust each week, and both the upper and under sides of the leaves must be covered.

The sulfur must be finely ground when used as a dust and it should contain 60 to 80 parts of sulfur, in addition to other materials like lime. Weekly applications of this dust also will prevent mildew or ornamental, and it will lessen many other flower diseases, such as the rusts of snapdragon, aster, and hollyhock.

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Architects to Buy School Equipment

then prepare specifications, advertise for bids, sign contracts, arrange contracts, take full charge of seeing that the equipment is delivered and installed. It will be the architect's responsibility to have the furniture and all rooms in the new building cleaned, polished, and ready for occupancy.

Monday's meeting was the first session of the new seven-man school board. One of the newly-appointed members, William B. Troupe, was administered the oath of office by Board President Howard J. Harlan. The other appointed member, Dr. Enoch H. Adams, was unable to attend the meeting, having been called upon an emergency case.

Bellefonte schools will open on Wednesday, September 3, and the board, at Monday's meeting reaffirmed its intention to bar from the local schools pupils from all outlying districts which have not settled tuition accounts in full. The Supervising Principal was instructed to deny admission to any pupil from districts which owe on tuition accounts when school opens.

The Finance Committee was given power to act in the matter of obtaining insurance on the new school building while construction operations are under way.

Supervising Principal Earl K. Stock reported that the proposed Civilian Pilots' Training Course which was to have been instituted here, has been abandoned because a sufficient number of qualified applicants were not available. Only eight applicants were able to pass the physical examinations, Mr. Stock said. A minimum of 25 students was needed for the course.

The board approved a defense training course in blue-print reading and granted permission for use of classrooms for such classes. Harry Menold, of the manual training department, is to be in charge of the classes.

Clarence B. Hendrickson, of Lititz, recently elected to a teaching position in Bellefonte, in a letter to the board asked to be released since he has an offer of a more suitable post in the Carlisle High School. The board accepted Mr. Hendrickson's resignation, with Mr. Schrad casting a dissenting vote on the grounds that the teacher had agreed to come here, even though no contract had been signed.

The board granted a \$5 monthly increase in salary to Ralph Haag, janitor. Mr. Schrad voted against the increase, declaring that teachers deserve increases in wages more than other school employees. Mr. Haag has been receiving a salary of \$80 a month.

It was indicated that a special meeting of the board will be held within a week or so to discuss the collection of taxes still outstanding on the 1940 duplicate. Members of the board expressed the belief that the 1940 duplicate should be closed before the tax collector is given the 1941 duplicate. Hay Matten, school treasurer, specially appointed to bring the school's tax records up to date, reported that he expects to have the task completed in the near future.

Board member R. C. Blaney, chairman of the building committee, reported that the concrete being used in the new school are being tested at intervals at a Pittsburgh laboratory. Specifications call for concrete which will withstand a pressure of 2000 pounds per square inch. Recent samples withstood pressures up to 3600 pounds a square inch, Mr. Blaney said.

The chairman also reported that Hunter & Caldwell recently had a prominent expert on building foundations inspect the foundations of the new building, and that the expert declared the work so far is entirely satisfactory.

The Building Committee was authorized to investigate the advisability of having a section between two walls of the new building excavated for use as a storeroom. Plans call for the section to remain unexcavated, but it was pointed out that the work could be done easily and at little expense before construction proceeds further, and that it would make available a storage space about 150 feet long, 9 feet high and 20 or 30 feet wide.

Completes Air Course
Samuel H. Lucas, son of Mr. and Mrs. Boyd Lucas, of Unionville, was graduated from an aviation mechanics course at the air base at Jacksonville, Fla., Saturday. The young man, who joined the U. S. Navy last January, will be stationed at the Jacksonville field.
