Cream of Tomato Soup: 2 teaspoons sugar, 1/4 teaspoon soda, 1 slice onion, 1 1/2 cups water, 4 tablespoons butter, 1 cup canned milk, 2 cups tomatoes, 3 cloves, 1 teaspoon salt, pepper, 1 cup water, 4 tablespoons flour, 6 pepper corns, Bit of bay leaf. Cook tomatoes slowly for 20 minutes with the 1 1/2 cups water and sugar. Melt butter, add flour, stirring constantly. Add milk diluted with 1 cup water. Cook until thickened, stirring all the while. Add to tomato mixture and serve at once.

Baked Hash: 1/2 cup fat, 1 1/2 cups cooked left over meat, 3 cups mashed potatoes, Onion juice, Salt and pepper, Chopped parsley. Grind the meat and season. Melt 1 tablespoon fat in a baking dish. Mix the ingredients well, moisten with milk. Put in the baking dish and bake in a moderate oven until brown on top.

Chocolate Blanc Mange: 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 cups canned milk, 2 ounces unseasoned chocolate, 1/4 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 2 1/2 cups water, 1/2 cup cornstarch. Combine 2 cups of water with the canned milk, pour into double boiler and bring to the boiling point. Mix the cornstarch, sugar and salt and mix with 1/2 cup of water. Add to the first mixture stirring constantly. Add the melted chocolate, stirring all the while until mixture thickens. Add vanilla and pour in 1/2 mold. Chill and serve with whipped cream.

Fruit Salad Dressing: 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1 teaspoon sugar, 1/2 teaspoon mustard, 1 cup whipped cream. Mix the first 4 ingredients, then add the whipped milk. Eggless Mayonnaise Dressing: 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons canned milk, 1/2 cup oil, paprika, 1 tablespoon lemon juice. Put salt and paprika in a bowl add canned milk and mix thoroughly. Add oil slowly, beating all the time. Then add lemon juice.

Bellefonte Boy Scouts, in charge of Robert McMullin, will be on duty to escort visiting firemen to their living quarters. The A. & P. room also will serve as headquarters for firemen and police, as a first-aid station, and as an information center.

Warning to Public Since all conventions, everywhere, attract thieves, pickpockets, and racketeers who are drawn by the prospect of easy money, officers of the Bellefonte Fire Department ask the residents of town to take extra precautions during convention week. It is suggested that all doors, windows and automobiles be kept locked, and that the public exercise such other precautions as may be necessary to protect property. It is hoped to prevent any thefts, but professional crooks no doubt will be among the crowds, ready to commit crimes which may be attributed to the visiting firemen. The convention committee has selected a number of State Police, fire police from Bellefonte and Lewisburg, and Borough police, and it is expected that in all, a total of 45 officers will be on duty during the convention. Reasonable co-operation on the part of the public should keep crime to a minimum.

Parade Arrangements Because of the unprecedented traffic congestion expected to result next Thursday—the day of the firemen's parade—Bellefonte residents are asked to keep their cars off the streets. Parking will be prohibited on Thursday from 9 a. m. until after the parade, on the following streets: Curtin, from Spring to Wilson; Linn, from Spring to Wilson; Wilson, from Curtin to Bishop; Bishop, from Community Field to Wilson; East High, from Jail to Wilson; Lamb, from Ridge to Wilson; Allegheny, from Linn to Bishop; Bishop, from Penn to Spring; Spring, from Bishop to High; High, from Allegheny to Thomas; Thomas, from High to Lamb; West Lamb, from Thomas to Spring; Spring, from Lamb to Curtin and Howard, from Allegheny to Wilson. One-way traffic will be in force Thursday on the following streets: travel east of Bishop; travel west of Howard from Wilson; travel north on Wilson.

First Event, Tuesday The first official activity during convention week will take place at 8 p. m. Tuesday night, August 19, when the Board of Control of the District Association will meet to prepare for the annual meeting the following day. Harold D. Cowher, of Bellefonte, president of the District Association, will preside at both sessions, which will be held in the Spring street school (Armory). Tuesday's session will be attended by officers and some delegates. Mayor Hardman P. Harris and Judge Ivan Walker will be among the speakers. The annual meeting of the Association is scheduled to begin at 10 a. m. Wednesday at the Spring street school. During the session officers of the association for the year will be chosen. They are, a president, three vice-presidents, a secretary and a treasurer. A brief memorial service will be conducted in honor of the memory of eight members who passed away during the past year. Sen. A. H. Letzler will be the memorial speaker.

The program includes the following features: invocation by Mgr. William E. Downes, of Bellefonte; address of welcome by Mayor Hardman P. Harris, Bellefonte; and addresses by the following persons: Arthur W. Eney, head instructor, Fire School, Public Service Institute; Dr. H. F. Alderfer, of State College, executive secretary of the Institute of Local Government; Congressman James E. VanZandt; Assemblyman Kenneth G. Haines; Douglas J. Harter, of Harrisburg, who will speak briefly on firemen's insurance; and Dr. J. J. Price, principal chemical engineer of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. The principal address will be given by Dr. Fred Hosler, head of the Bureau of Public Instruction, Harrisburg. Dr. Hosler received his doctor's degree in education from Columbia University, and was dean of the Canal Zone Junior College, Balboa, Canal Zone, from 1934 to 1940. He is now director of the Public Service Institute.

The Keystone Show, one of the largest carnivals on the road, will open at the Hughes Athletic Field, Monday, and will continue throughout the week. The convention committee will receive a part of all proceeds. Band concerts, dances, tours of the area and other forms of amusement are being provided. A free dance will be held at the Logan House from 9 to 1 o'clock Wednesday evening, August 20, with Shocker's orchestra furnishing the music. At 11 p. m. Saturday night, August 23, the convention will award a new Mercury sedan at the carnival grounds. Old Engine On the Diamond during convention week will be a real relic of Bellefonte's past fire fighting history. It is the 100-year-old pumper which represents the first piece of apparatus purchased for the Undine Company. The machine, mounted on four large wooden wheels, was built by John Agnew, of Philadelphia, and was designed to be drawn by firemen. Arriving at the scene, eight men manuever the double-handled pump while others bailed buckets of water into the body of the machine which served as a reservoir. Joe Bauer and Slim Howard, of the Undine Company, undertook the task of replacing missing parts of the machine and of restoring it to good condition. John Weber applied fresh paint, and when the engine is hauled to the Diamond the public will have a fair idea of fire protection as it was in 1841.

HOUSE PULLETS WHEN THEY START TO LAY Pulletts are usually housed when they start to lay. This practice can apply to pullets that mature at any season of the year, says County Agent R. C. Blaney, and probably under good housing conditions there need be no deviation from this practice which, in general, will give less trouble from moulting. In hot weather, however, careful management is required to provide the most comfort for the fowls. Insulation makes a house cooler in summer as well as warmer in winter. Cross-ventilation is important, too, and makes conditions on the floor and roosts more pleasant. Pulletts should be handled easily at housing time and not frightened or mistreated. It is best to lure them into the houses through feeding and training. Grading is a natural accompaniment of housing. It gives the slower developers a better chance to mature normally.
