ery would be installed immediately in the McCoy building, while the remainder would be shipped to Canada.

The machinery earmarked for use in Canada has been shipped to its destination where it is being used in the Canadian defense program. Other machinery which is to go into the local plant is in storage at the American Lime & Stone Company warehouse, it was said.

Mr. Sowers, expressing regret at the inability of his company to begin operations as planned, declared that production will begin as soon as possible, although he was unable to predict a probable date. According to the original announcement in July, the plant would employ six or eight men immediately, and would have an annual minimum capacity of 125,000 barrels. The plant would manufacture steel and wooden barrels, similar to the ones used in large quantities by the American Lime & Stone Company, Whitecroft Quarries, the National Gypsum Company and the Titan Metal Company. Output would be large enough to supply all local needs with a substantial surplus for shipment to other points. Approximately 5,000 square feet of floor space is available at the McCoy building.

Report Blast Preceded Fire in Farm Home

cause the fire. The house recently was wired for electricity, it was said. The 115-acre farm, for many years known as the Henderson farm, was purchased about ten years ago from the T. A. Shoemaker estate by former Centre County Sheriff E. R. Taylor, of Bellefonte. Mr. Lucas bought the farm five years ago. Mrs. Lucas said that some insurance was carried on the home and contents. During the time the Lucas family has resided on the farm, the house was on fire on two previous occasions, and the barn was destroyed, firemen report. Both of the earlier fires in the 10-room frame structure were discovered before they had made headway, and were extinguished. The barn burned down in February, 1940, it was said.

The call was received at approximately 9 o'clock and the Logan Fire Company responded. When they reached the farm home the entire building was enveloped in flames and since the water supply was extremely limited, firemen could do little except to protect other structures in the area.

The Lucas family lost all their possessions with the exception of the clothing they wore and a few small items carried out of the building before heat became too intense.

Firemen said that a quantity of oats was stored on the ground floor of the building, but the grain was spread out and it is believed that because of this factor sufficient heat would not have been generated to
