MOSES ROY GARLAND

Moses Roy Garland, of Altoona, died at his home at 4 o'clock Monday morning of a heart attack. Born in Altoona, May 11, 1881, he was the son of David and Sarah (Miller) Garland and had been employed for the past 25 years as watchman at the Altoona Brick company plant at Coburn, Blair county. His wife, Mrs. Sarah Regina (Thomas) Garland, died June 7, 1934. Members of the family include one daughter, Mrs. Christina Smith, at home; one grandson, Harold Roy Smith, of Maryland; two sisters and three brothers, Miss Bertha Garland and Mrs. Anna Funk both of Bellefonte; Frank and George Garland, of Hollidaysburg, and Charles of Bethlehem. Mr. Garland was of the Methodist faith.

HARRY C. FRAVEL

Harry C. Fravel, 76, well known building contractor, of Phillipsburg died at 10:15 o'clock, Tuesday night, September 2, 1941, at the Phillipsburg State Hospital where he had been taken Sunday night and placed under an oxygen tent. His death was caused by pneumonia and he was suffering with a weak heart. He had been in failing health for the last five or six years. Three weeks ago previous Mr. Fravel's wife died. She was the former Carrie Smith, of Snow Shoe, and they were married at Snow Shoe in 1898 and they moved to Chester Hill three years later. The deceased was the son of the late George and Mary Fravel. He was born April 11, 1865 at Snow Shoe. He is survived by a daughter, Mrs. R. H. Lohman of Chester Hill, and the following brothers and sisters: Mrs. Harry Reiser, Snow Shoe; Mrs. Mary Tobin, Williamsport; Mrs. W. J. Brennan, Williamsport; William H. Fravel, Chester Hill. Mr. Fravel constructed many of the homes and business buildings in Phillipsburg.

OPPORTUNITIES OFFERED IN U. S. MARINE CORPS

The U. S. Marine Corps offers young men between the ages of 17 and 30 a vast field in which they can learn a trade, educate themselves, or to travel on the high seas, in the tropics, and service in the magic land of China.

There are many vocational schools in which any Marine may choose and follow the trade learned while serving. Many men now employed in the defense industries learned their trade while in the Marine Corps and are drawing top wages. A few of the schools offered are as follows: clerical school, motor transport, telephone electricians, signal corps, radio, and many others. Any man enlisting now has a chance to better himself than ever before offered in the service.

For young men interested in bettering their high school education, may do so by enrolling in the Marine Corps Institute as soon as the initial training period is finished at Parris Island, S. C. A diploma is awarded to all who satisfactorily finish their course.

Men who have registered with the selective service and have not received their notice for the induction, can still enlist. The term of enlistment in the Marine Corps Reserve is for the duration of the National Emergency, and in the Regular Marine Corps, four years. The service of a Reserve is comparable to that of the Selective Service.

Direct relief payments to needy Centre countians during the week ended Tuesday show a decrease of \$34 from those of the previous week, and 4 checks less required to make the payments, according to State Treasurer G. Harold Wagner. Payments for the week totaled \$1175, which was \$1278 lower than those for the comparable week of last year. Current payments required 165 fewer checks than those of a year ago.

BELL COMPANY SAVES METAL FOR DEFENSE NEEDS

A saving of more than five million pounds of metals vital to de-

fense needs, including enough aluminum to build more than 275 fighter planes, is being effected by the Bell System this year through a materials substitution program, J. H. Caum, manager for the telephone company, said this week.

"Made possible through long range planning, research and readjustments in manufacturing," Mr. Caum declared, "the substituting of materials in 1941 will divert for use in defense work nearly 1,700,000 pounds of aluminum; almost a third of a million pounds of nickel; well over three million pounds of zinc, and 8,300 pounds of magnesium." He foresees additional reductions for 1942.
