Borough Manager George Carpen reported to Council that during the first month of the 160 meters have been in operation, collections from the machines totaled \$563.

Hint Bellefonte Site for Hospital

That Bellefonte has been chosen as the site for the proposed new 1500-bed Veterans' Hospital for Central Pennsylvania, was broadly hinted by Brigadier General Frank Hines, administrator of veterans' affairs, at the national V. F. W. convention at Philadelphia recently.

"I want to say that the new hospital site will be located in Central Pennsylvania. The central part of the state is ideal because of its water supply and other facilities," Hines said, according to a report by William W. Hampton, adjutant of the Bellefonte V. F. W. post.

Hampton added that Hines "looked right at me" and smiled as he spoke.

The proposed Bellefonte site is on Birchard street and consists of 430 acres.
