doing remarkably well there in high and fertile land, over-yielding the native variety as high as 46 per cent, or by an average of 29 per cent, say missionary agricultural teachers.

It is not only good in yield, but also good in quality. It gives 11 percent more flour than the native variety. Every year the supply of seed is insufficient to meet the demand. In a few districts the farmers offered three catties of native wheat in exchange for one catty of the improved wheat. According to the estimate of the provincial Bureau of Agriculture Improvement, it brings an additional annual revenue of half a million dollars to the Province.

China Missionaries of the Seventh-day Adventist Church report that "23,500 copies of our Chinese song book have been published during the time when our believers have been passing through fiery trials incident to the war.
