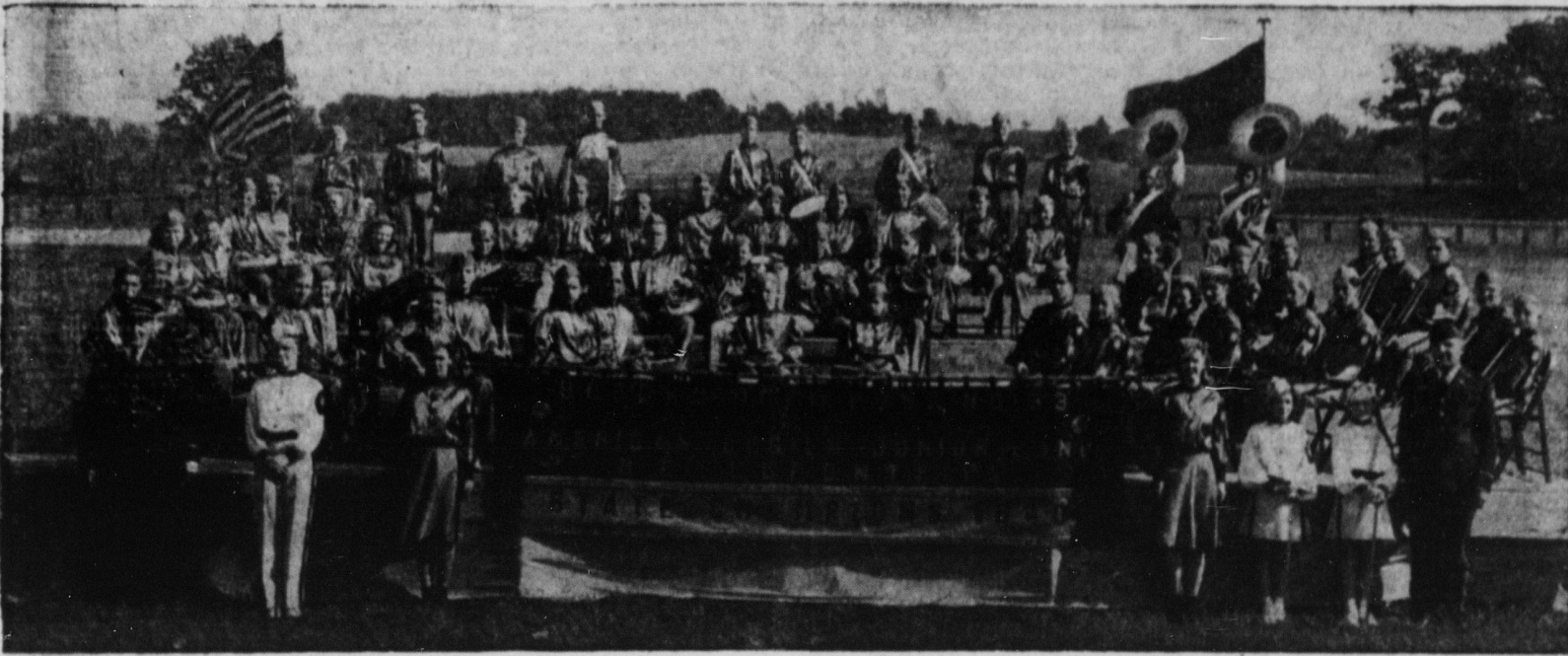


MISS NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP BY THREE POINTS

MANY COUNTY TEACHERS ARE COLLEGE GRADUATES

Statistics indicate that the teachers of Centre county have achieved a professional standard worthy of special commendation.

The record shows that of the 498 teachers, 194 are college graduates, or 47.5 per cent of the total number employed. It should be pointed out that in 1921 only 10.5 per cent had reached this level of preparation. The table further shows that the average percentage is 45.4 for all school districts of the fourth and third class under county superintendents, which places Centre county twenty-third on the list of sixty-six counties with respect to advanced preparation for teachers in the public schools.
