## Titan Plant On Semi-War Basis

ing how quickly local firemen could get to the plant in case of emergency. The drill, together with regular fire drills being held at frequent intervals inside the plant, was ordered by the FBI, which, with the U. S. Army, is charged with aiding in the protection of industries engaged in manufacturing defense needs.

Acting upon suggestions by the FBI a complete fire-fighting system recently was organized in the Titan plant. A giant pump was installed to pump water at high pressure from the spring on the plant property, while water from the Bellefonte borough water system is available at all times.

Workmen have been organized into fire-fighting units under the direction of John Gillen, former chief of the Undine Fire Company, who is a Titan employe. Fireplugs and reels of hose have been placed at strategic places throughout the property, and workmen are being given instruction in firefighting, the handling of bombs, and other information.

Members of both Undine and Lagan Fire Companies of Bellefonte have visited the plant to study the

fire fighting system and to familiarize themselves with the layout so that local fire companies could go into action at once in the event their services are needed.

## 'Cyclist Killed Near Coalport

### Victim Thrown 40 Feet After Crashing Guardrail Fence

A motorcycle suddenly encountered an automobile over the brow of a hill on route 53, across the highway, crashed into a guardrail fence and hurled its driver, Joseph Regosia, 25, a resident of Coalport, instantly to his death Tuesday morning.

Thomas McGarvey, 65, of Berwindale, line foreman of the Clearfield and Cambria Telephone Company, who with a helper, Russell Cavaner, Utahville, R. D., had been trimming trees along the road's edge, was in his auto on the left side of the highway and drove out in the path of the cycle as the latter gained the crest. It was learned.

The motorcycle struck the car's right front fender, veered into the fence on the right side and wrecked. Regosia's body was catapulted about 40 feet further down the road, it was reported. Cavaner, it was said, was some distance away from the scene and did not actually witness the crash.

An investigation of the fatality is being conducted by State Motor Police Privates A. C. Murarka and J. Paxton of the Phillipsburg substation, and Clearfield County Coroner Dr. E. S. Eckhardt, who announced an inquest will be held at a later date.
