### PENN STATE WILL HOLD POULTRY SHORT COURSE

A four-weeks short course in poultry husbandry will open at Pennsylvania State College on Monday, October 6. A complete survey of up-to-date methods of breeding, feeding, and management of flocks will be made, culminating with the annual Poultry Convention, October 27 to 31.

The short course is of particular importance because of an unusual demand for poultry products. It is open to any practical poultrymen or beginner in poultry raising who has a common school education. The entire four weeks will be packed with lectures, recitations and practice in brooding and rearing chicks, poultry nutrition, breeding, housing, marketing, disease and parasite con-

Mark Trees Now for Winter Cutting-During autumn before the leaves fall is a good time to check over the woodlot, extension foresters state. Use an axe or hatchet to mark the weak or sickly trees, so that they can be easily spotted. Later, when light cuttings are being made for home wood-supplies, the dying trees, which have been identified, can easily be seen and elimin-

Keep Heifers Growing-Heifers that have made excellent growth on pasture during the summer, often lose flesh in the late fall months because of neglect. If heifers are allowed to become thin it may take several weeks to get them back in growing condition again. Hay is an excellent feed for heifers. Grain feeding may be necessary in some
