

Hershey Rose Garden, With 7 Acres Blooms, at Height of Autumnly Glory

At this weekend the Hershey Rose Garden, with its thirty thousand plants will be at the height of its autumnal glory.

There are three periods in a rose season: Spring, when the colors are fair; Summer, mediocre; and Autumn, superb.

The seven hundred varieties, which cover seven acres of blooms, give much fragrance and the beds are colorful from whatever angle they are viewed.

The Hershey Rose Garden is free to the public, and in this its fifth season the number of visitors total more than one hundred thousand.

To add beauty to the garden two perfectly matched pairs of Australian swans (black in color with red backs) and two European swans (white with yellow beaks) now make their home in the Reflection Pool.

At the present time the garden is in a riot of color—red, white, pink, yellow, scarlet, crimson, orange, and apricot.

New roses form an important part of the rose display, and the Hershey Rose Garden affords a convenient opportunity to compare these with the old favorites.

Among the new roses that are outstanding are such red bloomers as the A Grille, Cardinal, Flambeau, Majorca, World's Fair, and Zulu Queen.

Vote Recount Is Cancelled (Continued from page one) the township asked for and were granted a recount, which was to have taken place Monday.

Meanwhile Phoebe Cronister and Erma Steele, residents of the township, filed objections to the proposed recount on the grounds that the law does not provide for a recount of liquor or beer referendum votes. The matter was aired at a hearing, Saturday, and the opinion was filed Tuesday.

Judge Walker, in his opinion, finds that referendum was held under provisions of the Liquor Control Act, and not under the authority of the State Election Code. The Liquor Control Act, the court adds, doesn't provide for any recount, and the Supreme Court has held there is no authority in the law for a contest of an election of that kind. The Election Code, the opinion continues, provides for the opening of ballot boxes on allegations of fraud or error, but only for recounting the votes cast for candidates for public office. It makes no provision for counting elections of other types, such as liquor referendums, the opinion sets forth.

Father and Son Killed in Mine (Continued from page one) the slate fall. He said neither Crain nor his son had brought their tools to the spot where the fall occurred. He explained that he thought Crain had bumped a cross-bar with his head and that the lagging and slate had then fallen, burying the father and son. Crain and his son were not working at the time of the fall. Cowler was pulling up rails about 15 feet to the rear of where Crain had been standing talking to his son when he felt a rush of air and heard a whistling sound as the slate fell. Looking around he saw the slate had fallen where Crain had been standing and that the fall of slate had tipped a mine car up in the air, almost burying him in the drift. Edging his way through a small space past the car he made his way past the fall and reached the entrance of the mine. He immediately began shouting for John whom he thought was at the mouth of the drift. Getting no reply he immediately summoned aid from the nearby Kassab mine. With the aid of several other miners the bodies were soon recovered. It is believed the two miners had suffocated in the slate fall. Dr. C. H. Ambrose, Oconoco Mills physician, who has been telephoned as soon as the accident was discovered, was at the mine before the second body was recovered. Mr. Cowler added that George Crain had told him that he wanted to load a car of coal for a Phillipsburg physician but that he had told the Hudson man, that since the roof was bad and getting dangerous, no more coal would be taken from the mine. The mine owner was pulling up rails in preparation to close the mine. The man who put money above everything else will find one day, that money is above everything else.
