(Continued from page one) be called upon to defend our eastern seaboard. x x x The 1941 Legislature has authorized the extension of the highway, which now has its terminals at Middlesex near Harrisburg, and Lynde near Pittsburgh, to Philadelphia and the western boundary of the state. Since the opening of the present toll road, 2,196,000 vehicles have rolled over it, paying \$2,437,822 in fees. An additional \$162,335 from concession has boosted the total income as of August 31, to \$2,599,990. Jones estimated the September returns at roughly \$400,000. High point in traffic was reached last month when 368,928 vehicles paid fares amounting to \$407,331. This plus \$31,181, from concessions, made a total of \$438,512.
