(Continued from page two) Springer, "but the heart of the hymn was the line with which the translator started, 'Can you take an insult?' Every man, there, layman as well as pastor, knew that that question struck home to the core of his being. Could they take it? They sang with fervor, 'Lord, we can take it in thy name!'"

The Rev. Mrs. Maude Royden and the Rev. Dr. Lemle Weatherhead, two of England's outstanding ministers, are expected to arrive in the United States late in October for

a speaking and preaching tour of the principal cities of this country. The ministry of both has been in connection with the famous City Temple of London, now badly damaged by recent air raids. Dr. Weatherhead is the present pastor of the Temple, but has been carrying on his services at the nearby Church of the Holy Sepulchre which has opened its doors to the other, wise homeless congregation. The International American meeting of these visitors is expected to be in New York City on Monday, November 3. The World Council of Churches is planning this and other early meetings; later Dr. Weatherhead and Mrs. Royden will take part in the National Preaching Mission.

Recent word from colleges and universities carried on in China under the leadership of various Protestant mission agencies from America, and supported by part of American gifts, indicates that the war has hampered but not stopped their teaching. Yenching University, near Peiping (Peking), remains on its own campus and has a large

enrollment of students. Hangchow University is now located in Shanghai where it cooperates with three other Christian schools in a rented office building. Three other colleges—Ginsing College, the University of Nanking, and Cheelo University—are "refugee" institutions, having "migrated"—students, faculty—and as much equipment as they could carry—out of invaded territory into West China. They are the "guests" of West China University on its campus in Chengtu, Szechwan Province. Despite their crowded quarters, the four colleges in Chengtu report the largest enrollments in their history.

A truck driver and his helper were injured Thursday when a truck hauling for the Maryellen Coal Company, of Shawsville, Clearfield County, planned over the steep Shawsville mountain and landed upside down 100 feet down the mountain.
