Clothing Store Here Is Sold

some years, will handle nationally known clothing and haberdashery.

The Montgomery store had its beginning in 1838 when John Montgomery, grandfather of W. Hassall Montgomery, opened a tailoring shop in the Benner property which stood on the site of the present Murphy Five and Ten, on West High street just off the Diamond.

John's son, Frank Montgomery, business was expanded. In addition to the store at Bellefonte, a branch store was conducted at Lewisburg, home of Bucknell University, from 1913 to 1935. Another branch store flourished in State College from 1913 until 1926, when fire wiped out the business block in which the store was located. A new and modern building was erected by Mr. Montgomery on the same site, but shortly after its completion the depression, together with the large financial loss suffered in the fire, worked against the enterprise and the store was disposed of in 1935.
