

PREVIEW OF LOGANS' \$8000 NEW PUMPER



Although delivery of the Bellefonte Logan Fire Company's new pumper is not expected until next March, the photo above is an almost exact duplicate of the machine ordered last week by the local firemen. The truck, manufactured by the Buffalo Fire Appliance Corp. at Buffalo, N. Y., will be equipped with a 500-gallon pump; a 200-gallon booster tank; large hose compartment, and seating capacity for eight men

In the cab will be heating and defrosting tubes. The truck will carry a siren, flood-lighting system, hand extinguishers for fighting special types of fires. The machine will be powered by a 152-horsepower six-cylinder motor.
