INSPECT BEEKEEPING IN CENTRE COUNTY

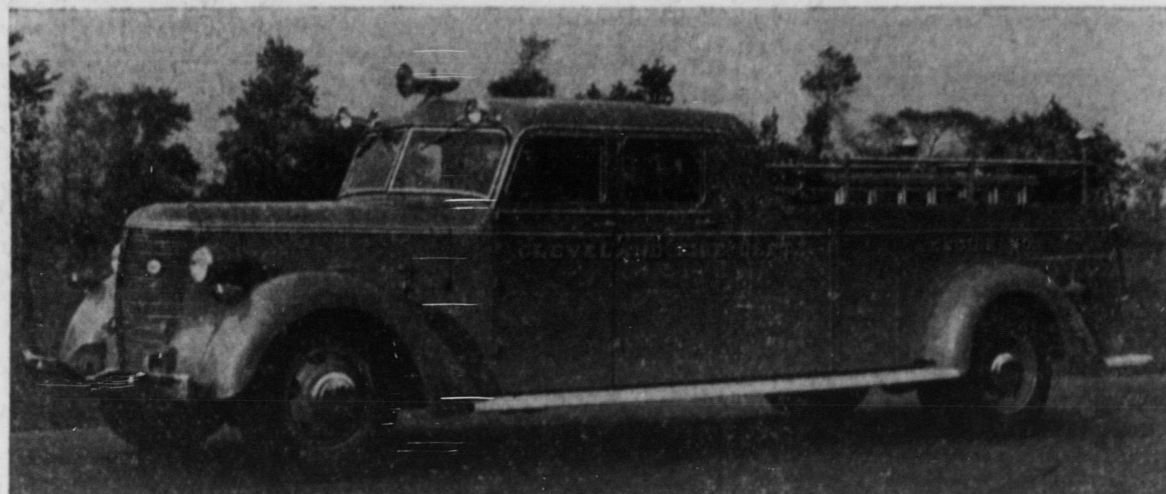
A recent inspection of all bee yards in Centre county has just been completed. The inspection was made by R. V. Gordon, of Freeburg, Pa., representing the Department of Agriculture at Harrisburg.

There are 225 beekeepers in Centre county owning 1630 colonies of bees. Of this group 160 yards, or approximately 200 colonies, were infected with American foul brood. This is the disease which is very serious to the beekeeper. The remedy is to destroy the colonies infected and extensive fumigation of equipment.

According to County Agent R. C. Blaney, there will be approximately forty tons of honey produced by Centre county beekeepers this year. Most of this honey is produced in small yards for home consumption. However, some of our larger beekeepers produce for sale honey on a commercial scale.

PREVIEW OF LOGAN'S \$8000 NEW PUMPER



Although delivery of the Bellefonte Logan Fire Company's new pumper is not expected until next March, the photo above is an almost exact duplicate of the machine ordered last week by the local firemen. The truck, manufactured by the Buffalo Fire Appliance Corp. at Buffalo, N. Y., will be equipped with a 500-gallon pump; a 200-gallon booster tank; large hose compartment, and seating capacity for eight men in the streamlined cab. In the cab will be heating and defrosting tubes. The truck will carry a siren, flood-lighting system, hand extinguishers for fighting special types of fires. The machine will be powered by a 152-horsepower six-cylinder motor.
