Two years' supply of paper for the printing of the Bible in High Malay, in Japanese and in Toba-Batak—three of the most widely used native languages of the Netherlands Indies—has been shipped to the Far East by the American Bible Society.

The Thailand (Siam) Mission of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A. has carried on more normally than other missions of the denomination in the Far East, reports the Board of Foreign Missions of that Church.

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7-Minute STEAMED CABBAGE. 1 small head new green cabbage, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 4 tablespoons butter. Shred or chop cabbage very fine. Cover with cold water and let stand for 1 hour or longer. Lift cabbage into saucepan, shaking to remove excess moisture. Add salt and butter. Cover. Bring to steam point using High heat of electric unit. Turn switch to Low and cook 7 minutes longer.
