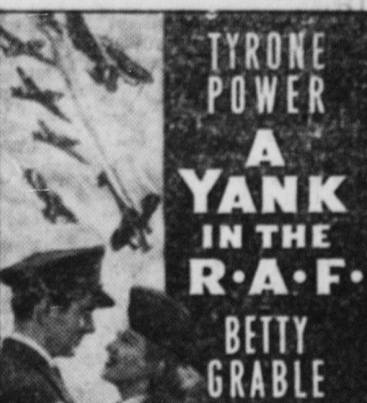

instruction, four hours per week of which 70 per cent consists of practice work, making use only of such equipment which the average family would be expected to own. The course stresses health measures, care of babies, children and aged. The course is planned for the following communities: Milesburg, Pleasant Gap, Howard, Hubersburg, Unionville, Monument, Grivston, Clarence, Snow Shoe, and Bellefonte. The classes will be instructed by a registered nurse, usually some one in the community who meets the requirements of the National Red Cross. At the completion of the course the members receive a Home Nursing certificate, and they will form a vital aid to National Defense. The course is free, the only cost being a text book at 75 cents. Any person or persons interested in the course is asked to write or call Mrs. Ben J. Beezer, East Bishop street, or telephone 105-W. More information will be published as the work gets under way.
