

WARRANTS IN CRASH NEAR HOWARD

Car Rams Headlong Into Parked Truck

Brother Seriously Injured in First Fatal Accident on New Road

DRIVER CLAIMS HE DIDN'T SEE TRUCK

Victim, Frank G. Nyman, 41, Howard, R. D. 2, is Father of Five

The new Howard-Beech Creek Highway, not yet open to the public, claimed its first motor accident victim about 6:10 o'clock Tuesday night when a car bearing two brothers from Lock Haven to their home between Milesburg and Curtin, crashed headlong into a truck parked on the partly completed road, near the Ray Bullock farm, two miles east of Howard.

Frank Gaylord Nyman, 41, of Howard, R. D. farmer and worker on the highway project, died at the Lock Haven Hospital at 7:10 p. m., ten minutes after his admission to that institution. Death resulted from a fractured skull and broken neck. Other injuries included a fractured arm and leg, and lacerations.

His brother, James Nyman, Jr., 32, believed to have been the operator of the car, is in serious condition at the hospital, suffering lacerations of the head, chest injuries and shock. He was found hanging from the window, caught by the feet in the steering wheel and with his head nearly touching the pavement. His brother, Frank, was crushed in the seat.

Mr. Nyman, father of five children, was returning with his brother James, from the Lock Haven Hospital where Frank had been visiting. His daughter, Genevieve, seriously ill at the hospital, James is employed in the stone quarries at Salona.

The crash was heard by Ray Bullock, owner of the nearby farm, who with his son went at once to the scene of the crash at a cut below what is known as Schenck's Hill.

School Board Sued for \$1400

Burr & Co. Bases Claim on Contract For Sale of Bonds for Building

Burr & Co., Philadelphia investment bankers, this week filed suit against the School District of Belleville for \$1400, with interest from July 1, 1941.

The statement of claim filed by the banking house alleges that on September 4, 1940, the Belleville school board invited Ward Tate, of Salona, representative of Burr & Co., to appear before the board to discuss ways and means of constructing a new school building.

Mr. Tate appeared at the meeting, and as an aftermath, on October 9, 1940, the board entered into a contract with Burr & Co., in which it was agreed that the bank would receive \$1400 as compensation for the sale of \$280,000 in bonds for the new high school building.

NEGLIGENCE CITED IN JURY'S REPORT

Witness Expresses Belief Driver Shifted Into Wrong Gear

Negligence on the part of the driver of the car was assigned by a Coroner's Jury as the cause of the grade crossing accident at Central City, October 16, in which three local residents lost their lives and a fourth miraculously escaped death.

The jury, meeting at the Centre County Hospital Monday night, heard the testimony of Paul McGarry, 30, of Belleville, who escaped death in the crash as well as statements by members of the train crew and the State Motor Police officer who investigated the mishap.

McGarry gave his testimony from a litter which was wheeled onto the sun porch of the hospital. He suffered fractures of both legs, and on the morning after the inquest underwent an operation in which plates were inserted to aid in healing the fractures.

Under the questioning of Centre County Coroner Charles Shecker, of Milesburg, McGarry related that he met Walter Baney, 65; Mrs. Kathleen Brown, 40, and Mrs. Lynn

Belleville Ready For Big Hallowe'en Parade, Friday

Boy Drowns in Small Stream

Two-Year-Old Tusseyville Child Falls Off Footbridge—Father Finds Body

Toddling out on a footbridge spanning a small creek which runs between the house and barn on his father's farm near Tusseyville, late Monday afternoon, Thomas S. Brouse, aged 2 years, son of Mr. and Mrs. William L. Brouse, fell from the bridge and was drowned in less than a foot of water.

The child's lifeless body was found about 5:30 o'clock by his father, who with other members of the family began a search for the boy when his absence was noticed. It is believed that in the four-foot drop from the bridge the boy was momentarily stunned, for had he been able to sit up his head would have been well out of the water.

NLRB Orders New Election

Upholds Whiterock Quarries' Objections to Union Election August 6

Upholding objections of Whiterock Quarries as to the conduct of the August 6 union election at the plant, the National Labor Relations Board on Friday ordered a new election to be held within 30 days.

The election was held on August 6, but the board in its decision said: "We find that under the circumstances the method of counting impaired the secrecy of the ballot and that the objections raised substantial and material issues with respect to the conduct of the election."

At the election, held for the purpose of determining whether Whiterock Quarries employees wanted the United Cement, Lime & Gypsum Workers' International as their collective bargaining agent, the Union representatives challenged eight votes, of which six were denied, according to reports. One was upheld, and one was not decided.

The new election must be held within 30 days of the date of the board's ruling, October 24, it is claimed.

Whiterock Quarries is engaged in the manufacture of lime and limestone products, with main offices at Belleville, and quarries at Pleasant Gap and Jacksonville.
