World of Religion

man of a committee of 200 laymen of all Christian denominations—known as the Laymen's National Committee—organized to observe "Bible Week" from December 8 to 14. "The Bible in the hands of every American" as a means of promoting national unity and national defense is the aim of the organization.

After more than sixty years of missionary service under the Methodist church in Japan, the Rev. Dr. and Mrs. Charles Bishop have returned to the United States, and are living at 125 East Sunset Boulevard, Los Angeles. At the time of their departure they were the oldest American residents in Japan, having first gone there in 1879 Dr. and Mrs. Bishop retired from active missionary professorship in Aoyama Gakuin in 1926, but continued to carry on their work until this year. Upon completion of this long period of service, Ambassador Joseph C. Grew wrote: "Your constructive work through the years, especially your work at Aoyama Gakuin, will not be forgotten, for our Japanese friends do not readily forget such selfless service as you have rendered. I know that among your associates are many prominent Japanese whom you first met as students. . . . You have contributed much to mutual understanding and goodwill."

Speaking recently at the Temple Israel, New York City, Rabbi William F. Rosenblum said that complacency, compromise, and convenience are the major aims of present-day society. "There is no need to wait until this war is over to fix the war guilt," he said. "Nearly every one of us has had a part in its coming because we have been too complacent about our slums, and our wage slaves, and our bigotries, and a hundred and one infractions of the laws of God for man."

Undaunted by the war and threats of further war in the Far East, the Board of Foreign Missions of the Presbyterian church in the U. S. A. is gathering recruits to their already large missionary staff in China—awaiting the time when they can secure passports for that land. Eight new recruits have been studying the Chinese language during the past war in the Philippines, and four others are doing the same in Hongkong. Of twelve others recently commissioned, two are enroute to the School of Chinese Studies in Manila, and the others are enrolled in a temporary Chinese language school at the University of California. The board reports that not one of its thirty-one mission stations in China has been closed and that church, school and hospital activities have reached new peaks of service.

Addressing the students of a Christian university in China recently, Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek, himself a Christian, said: "We have plenty of man power for the army without you. We need to remain in school to complete your training for Christian leadership in the new China that will emerge from the war."

After ten years of labor, a committee of church scholars has produced a new translation of the new Testament in "Basic English." Basic English had been developed by

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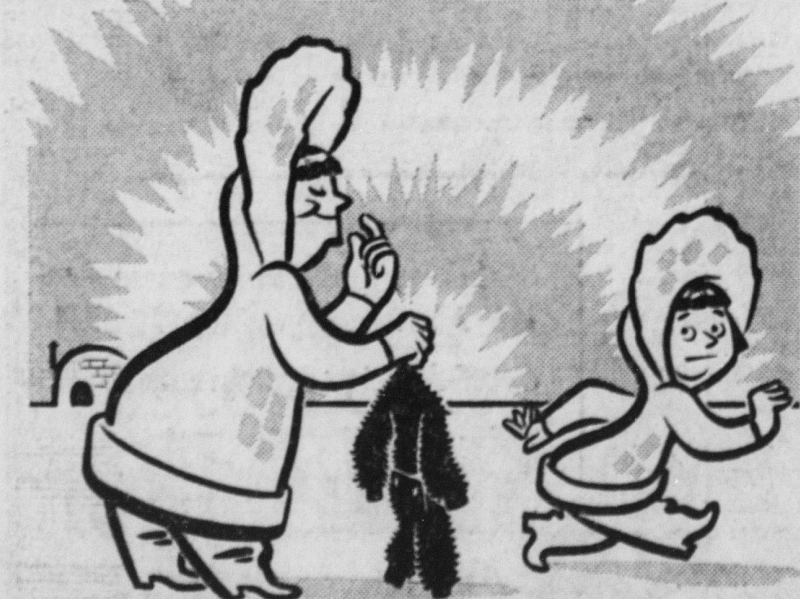
