Gettig Chosen District Attorney

Returns from 7,543 of the state's 8,140 precincts showed the election of Justice William M. Parker, Republican, for the Supreme Court over Judge W. Russell Carr, Democrat, by more than 200,000 votes. Judge Charles E. Kenworthy, Republican, won for the Superior Court over Judge Michael A. Musmanno, Democrat, by more than 140,000 votes in the same number of precincts. The vote: Supreme Court: Parker, 1,335,953; Carr, 1,120,317. Superior Court: Kenworthy, 1,311,871; Musmanno, 1,170,863. Philadelphia Close Philadelphia's unofficial returns were so close that precautions were taken at once to guard all ballot boxes until the official count starts. Republicans apparently won all Philadelphia contests except one. Dr. Robert C. White, Democrat, was re-elected city controller by a margin of about 4,000 votes. The extraordinary guard over the city boxes was ordered by Judge L. Stauffer Oliver, who said the Republican City Committee, the Democratic City Committee and the County Board of Elections were in agreement. The Philadelphia returns, with only a few thousand votes separating opposing candidates, was described by election officials as the closest in the city since 1911.
