JERRY CRANDALL
Jerry Crandall, of Snow Shoe, died at 5:10 p. m. Tuesday, November 4, 1941, at the County Home, Bellefonte. Mr. Crandall, who had been a patient at the home since December 13, 1938, was born in Clinton county 79 years ago last June 14. Funeral services will be held at 1:30 o'clock Friday afternoon at the Wetzel Memorial chapel, Milesburg. Interment will be made in the Pleasant Gap cemetery.

WILLIAM WETZEL
William Wetzel, native of Bellefonte but for many years a resident of the west, died on Wednesday, October 29, 1941, at the home of his only son, Gilbert, at Sioux City, Iowa. Mr. Wetzel was a son of John and Susan Musser Wetzel and was born in the house on Penn street now occupied by the Jerry Galada family, on May 13, 1871, making his age at time of death 70 years, 5 months, and 16 days. Surviving in addition to the son at whose home he died are two brothers: Charles, of Thomas street, in Bellefonte, and Lewis, of Toledo, Ohio. Funeral services were held Saturday with interment at Superior, Nebraska.

74% OF CENTRE COUNTY RESIDENTS GET ASSISTANCE

The percentage of population in Centre County wholly or partially dependent on one of the four types of State Assistance or on WPA was 74 per cent, as of September 1941, according to a report of the State Department of Public Assistance. Some of Centre County's neighboring counties had the following percentages: Clinton 9.1; Huntingdon 8.5; Clearfield 13.8; Mifflin 7.5; Blair 7.4; and Union 5.1. With Lackawanna County showing the highest rate of 14.7 per cent and Montgomery County a rate of 21, Centre County is at about the midway point in comparison with the rest of the state.

ers reported a car had stopped and picked up produce. The license tag number was obtained and the two men upon being questioned admitted the thefts. Derr, who had never been in trouble before, told the court that Meyers suggested taking the produce as they were enroute home from State College, where they were employed. He was sentenced to pay the costs of prosecution, a fine of \$1, make restitution of goods taken, and serve 15 days in the county jail. Meyer, who admitted suggesting the taking of the goods, and whose record shows four previous appearances in court here, was sentenced to pay a fine of \$1, the costs, restitution, and serve 60 days in the county jail. Dean Gilmore, 19, of Millheim R. D., appeared before Judge Walker and entered a plea of guilty to burglary. Gilmore was charged with taking 38 chickens, valued at \$62.50 from the hen house of Clair Nichols in Penn Township. State Police from Rockview substation, investigating the robbery, told Nichols to attend a livestock public sale at Centre Hall. When Nichols saw his hens offered for sale, he traced the "ownership" to Gilmore. In court Gilmore declared he took the chickens because he needed the money. Since it was his first offense the youth was sentenced to pay the costs and serve 7 days in jail.
