scious; to interpret the library and its uses to the people; to bring to the attention of the library the book needs of individuals and groups in remote parts of the county; to work generally for the welfare and advancement of the library.

The most immediate objective of the Centre County Friends of the Library is to complete the bookmobile fund which still lacks \$300 needed to equip the panel truck with mechanical devices and shelving to carry 600 books to rural districts. The 1942 Dodge panel truck that is to become the bookmobile has already been delivered to the Library Board by the Decker Motor Co., Bellefonte, which furnished the truck without profit.

Mrs. Cowell said she would begin at once to organize the county into local units and sub-divisions so that every village and its surrounding rural area would be included in the Friends of the Library. Mrs. Cowell who is also County chairman of the Federated Clubs of Centre County is organizing the Friends of the Library in connection with the plan of the Federated Clubs to study the various civic needs of the county and to lend aid where the need is greatest.

Undines Have 50th Birthday

near the close of the 19th century, so many disastrous fires occurred in Bellefonte that Council reorganized the Department, created one head and placed both Companies under its management at first.

In 1898 the Undine Company purchased the lot and built the fine building on East Bishop street it now occupies.

With the opening of the present century the Department functioned much more efficiently, and in 1914, with what might be termed the beginning of the motor age, the Undines bought an automobile on which to carry chemical apparatus and hose. By 1920 the Department

was completely motorized. Since then fire schools and other educational programs have converted the old-time willing but unlightened "smoke-eater" into the present day fireman who is just as willing as his prototype of half-century ago, but whose services are far more valuable because he is trained to fight fire and meet other emergencies in an intelligent and efficient manner.
