Bellefonte had what might be called a 50-50 season. The Red and White team scored four victories and suffered four defeats. One game, with Renovo, was cancelled because of the prevalence of infantile paralysis in that city.

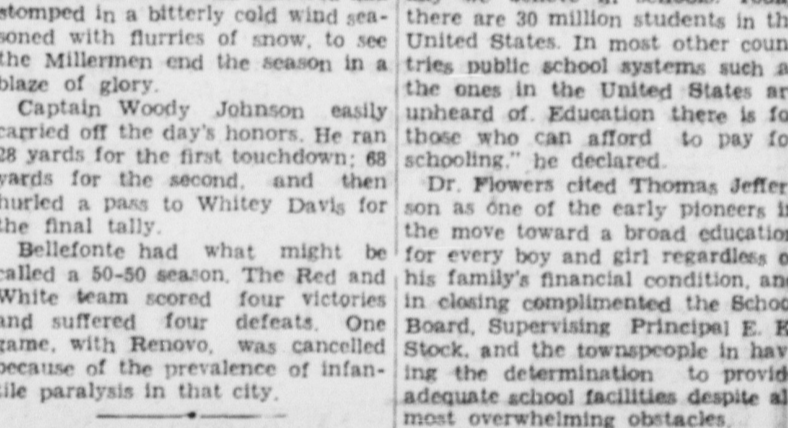
