"Under the Fair Labor Standards Act," said the regional directors, "all employees engaged in interstate commerce or the production of goods for interstate commerce are entitled to time and a half for overtime after 40 hours per week This includes watchmen, office workers and all other so-called nonproduction employees.

"Officials of the company were under the impression that overtime ay did not have to go to watchmen but when an inspector for the Division explained the act to them, they gave excellent cooperation in computing the amount due and arranged to make immediate payment on a voluntary basis.
