Monday morning the two appeared before Judge Ivan Walker here and entered pleas of guilty to escaping from prison. Kelley was sentenced to serve 7 1/2 to 15 years and Thompson, Henry, Marsia Furness, 2 to 4 years, to be computed from the expiration of their original sentences.
Tuesday morning Sheriff Edward R. Miller took both prisoners to Pittsburgh to begin their terms.
