Last week the Grand Jury, headed by Roy Fisher of Wingate, as foreman, after inspecting the county property submitted the following report:

The ceiling of the Court Room should be repaired, cleaned and painted; ceilings in the offices on first floor of Court House should be repaired and windows washed; ventilators in the roof of the Court House should be painted and sky-light cleaned.

At the jail the jury recommended that a fireproof place be provided for ashes; that storage of boxes and rubbish be prohibited; that fire extinguishers be placed, especially in the basement; that the plumbing should be overhauled and checked; that down spouting on outside of building be repaired; and that better space be provided for juvenile inmates.

The jury commended the Superintendent of the County Home and other officials on general cleanliness of premises and good condition of patients.

(Continued from page one) ization session, Dr. E. H. Adams and William B. Troupe, also elected as directors last month, had received the oath of office before the meeting.

The hearing scheduled for Monday, December 15, on charges brought by former school director Franklin B. Schad against Supervising Principal Earl K. Stock, will be held in the court room, it was decided at the meeting. The hearing will begin at 7 p. m. and it is hoped to complete the taking of testimony that night.

Blanket subpoenas are to be given Mr. Schad and Mr. Stock so that they may appear whenever they please to testify without revealing the names of such witnesses before the hearing.

The hearing will be conducted in much the same manner as a court trial with the complainant presenting his side of the case first. Board members will act as judge and jury and after the testimony is completed the board will retire to consider its verdict. A two-thirds majority vote is needed to decide the case one way or another.

Miss Mary Hartle, secretary to Judge Ivan Walker, was chosen as a disinterested public stenographer to take testimony and record the proceedings of the hearing, and it is believed that both Mr. Schad and Mr. Stock will be represented by attorneys. The board's solicitor, Master W. Gettig will be on hand only in the capacity of advisor to the board.

The hearing will be open to the public.
