Collinson—Haag

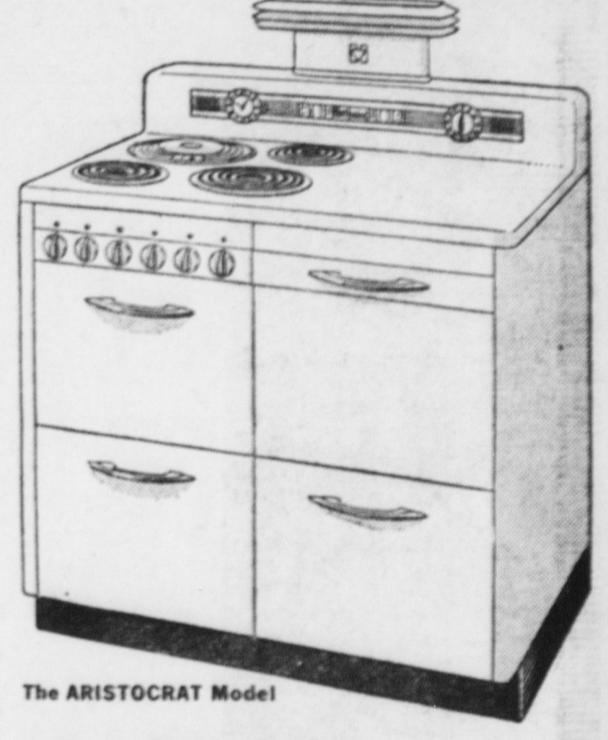
