#### GRADE SCHOOL TO PRESENT "PIED PIPER"

Malcolm D. Fleming, a former Centre Hall resident, died Friday, November 28, at his home at 2631 W. Brown avenue, Spokane, Wash., of a heart condition. He was aged 62 years.

The deceased was a son of Julian A. and Ellen Fleischer Fleming, and was born in Centre Hall, August 22, 1879.

He had been a merchant tailor for many years at Spokane and previously had lived at Wheeling, West Virginia. He left Centre Hall at the age of eighteen when his mother died, and lived for some time with relatives in Ohio.

The late Mr. Fleming was a member of the Masonic fraternity, the Junior Order of Mechanics, and the Presbyterian church.

He is survived by his wife, Bertha Weaver Fleming, and one brother, D. Earl Fleming, of New Rochelle, N. Y.
