



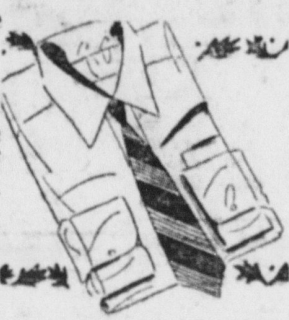

**Teachers Ask Wage Increase**

is \$1200, it was reported. Maximum teacher salaries range up to \$2300. A ten per cent increase in salaries would entail an additional expenditure of more than \$7,000 a year, officials estimated. Several board members expressed the belief that because of living conditions teachers are entitled to extra salaries, but budgetary limitations are a serious obstacle.

Announcement was made that the School Board is in readiness for the hearing of Supervising Principal Earl K. Stock on charges brought against him by former School Director Franklin B. Schind. The hearing will be held at the Court House beginning at 7 o'clock Monday evening, December 15. Although the board has expressed a hope that the hearing will be concluded at one session, other sessions will be held if necessary, it was reported.

The hearing is open to the public. Discussion was held upon the insurance held on bond property and on the question of ownership of property given to the band by various groups and individuals. Band officials reported that all contributions to the band have been outright gifts, with the owners retaining no real or implied claim. Insurance of band property is to be further studied.

The board authorized the purchase of a second-hand paper baler at a cost of \$7.50; instructed the building committee to complete some needed minor repairs to the Bishop street building and granted the use of the Spring street gymnasium on the following dates: December 12, for a Boy Scout meeting; December 20, for the annual Christmas party of American Lime and Stone Company employees' children; December 22, for the annual Christmas party of Titan Metal Company employees' children.

**DO YOU KNOW?**

Nevin W. Moyer, teacher and historian of Linglestown, Pa., has a collection of rifles many of which belonged to families who lived in the Indian Gap area. All of them are flint locks.

At the Landis Museum, four miles northeast of Lancaster, there is a Pennsylvania "Dutch" collection of more than 200,000 items. Originally the Landis brothers, who are in charge of the museum, kept the antiques in their home which already had eleven cats and one dog. Then they began to fill their barn and sheds. Today, the fine museum is considered one of the best of its kind.

One of the most interesting remnants of early Pennsylvania is the old mill wheel at Great Valley Mills, located four miles west of Valley Forge in Chester Valley. The mill was founded by a Welshman, Thomas Jermain in 1710 and for 231 years, whole wheat flour has been ground on this site and the wheel has never ceased turning.

Alexander Gavers, at Freeedville, Pa., just 10 miles northeast of Lewistown, is visited by thousands of persons each year who enjoy the underground mystery created by Nature. There are stalactites and stalagmites in various grotesque and beautiful shapes and formations. There are more than a dozen caves in the Keystone State open to the public every year.

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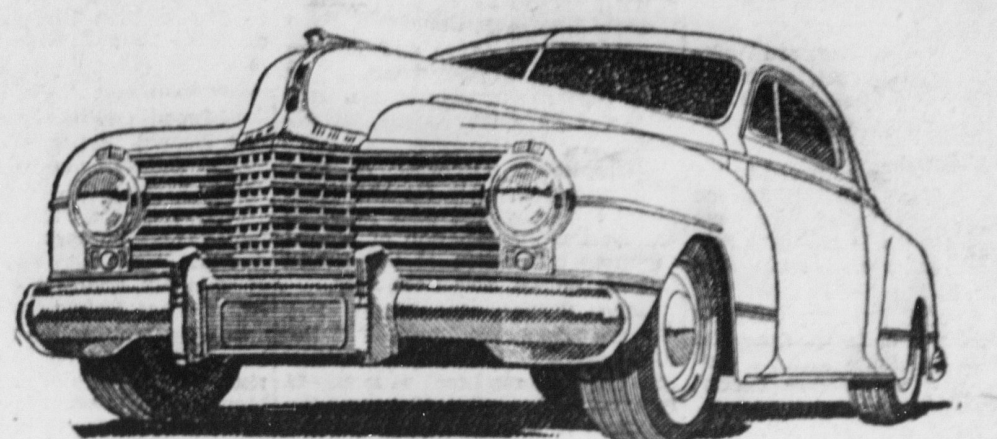
The Christmas vacation in the schools will begin with the close of schools Tuesday, December 23, and will reopen on Monday, January 5, it was announced.

treatment for a large crease in the flesh of the front part of his right leg near the hip. His condition is not serious but he expects to remain in the hospital for several days.

The two men were members of the same party and were going out to vantage points to watch white-tailed deer.

Game Warden Thomas Mosier, of Bellefonte, who investigated the mishap, said Bartos was shot by Adolph Durachko, 17, of Clarence. Mosier said the accident happened about 8:30 a. m. while visibility was poor because of fog and misty rain. Durachko, formerly a resident of Allentown, said he was shooting at

a buck when he fired the shot. He was about 60 yards away from Bartos at the time, investigation revealed. Bartos was in a kind of clearing while Durachko was shooting from the brush, Mosier indicated.

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Theodore Carper, 25, of Tyrone, accidentally shot above the heart last Monday by a bullet fired by his excited sister, just after a member of their party had shot a buck, it is reported to be in "fair condition" at the Philipsburg State Hospital.

conducts a service station; two brothers, Paul E. and Donald R., both of Jersey Shore, and three sisters, Jean, Mary and Faye, all at home.

Charles William Narehood enlisted in the army in February 1940 after having attended colleges in California and Tennessee. He was a graduate of the Snow Shoe High School.

When word was received here yesterday morning of his death, his brother, Charles Narehood, Pine Glen lumberman, was serving on a jury in a civil case. When the jury returned to the court room from visiting the scene of a disputed road damage claim, Judge Ivan Walker summoned the juror to the bench, and told him that his brother had died in Hawaii, and offered to excuse the juror from further service if he so desired.

Narehood, realizing that if he left the jury the entire case would have to be retried, informed the Court he would "see it through."

He told newspapermen that he had always taken a great interest in his brother and had supplied the funds with which he secured a higher education after graduating from the Snow Shoe High School. He said that his brother had specialized in aviation ground work, particularly in the branch devoted to the detection and compilation of information regarding the locating of enemy aircraft.

Last fall, George Narehood continued, his brother had completed ten months of special training in an Army school at Hawaii. He recalled that day before yesterday he had mailed his brother a letter, enclosing \$1 in stamps, so that Charles wouldn't be put to any additional expense in writing home.

Survivors in addition to the parents and the brother, George, include three other brothers: Willard, of Woodland; John, at home, and Leonard, of Pine Glen, and four sisters, Mrs. John Hodgen, of Satterdale; Mrs. Beatrice Wheeler, of Clearfield; Mrs. Parks Moore, of Karthaus, and Mrs. Blair Benton, of Pine Glen.
