Hits Monument At Milesburg (Continued from page one) dislocation of one ankle, head laceration.

Bruce Emigh, 19, Bellefonte, R. D., severe lacerations of one ankle and possible fracture of bone in ankle.

Dean Runkle, 21, Centre Hall, a compound fracture of left ankle.

The driver of the machine, Guy Shively, 18, of Buffalo Run Valley, suffered a laceration of the scalp and left eyebrow, and a slight injury to the chest. He was able to leave the hospital, Monday.

Dorothy Shank, sister of Edna and Lois Shank, underwent treatment at the hospital dispensary for minor injuries and was permitted to go home.

The injured persons were brought to the hospital in the E. E. Widdowson and Wetzler ambulances and in cars of passing motorists.

According to reports, the car, owned by Shively's father, Andrew Shively, of Buffalo Run Valley, was traveling west through Milesburg shortly before 2 a. m. when it struck the monument. The machine then veered around on the road and came to rest facing in the opposite direction.

Several of the occupants of the machine were said to have been thrown out, and one of the men is reported to have struck his head against the stone monument.

Another version of the crash is that shortly before the Shively machine reached the monument another car, traveling in the opposite direction, sideswiped the Shively car, causing the driver to lose control. It is reported that a hubcap from another car was found on the road near the scene of the crash, although Motor Police from Pleasant Gap who investigated the accident did not verify this version.

The car was reduced to junk by the impact. Part of the machine's transmission was torn loose and hurled some distance from the wreckage.

In recent months several other cars have plowed into the Milesburg monument, which is situated in the center of the highway at this communication.
