

TIP TO JAP PILOTS

To Lt. Stephen Saltzman, of Wilmington, Del., you're just like a duck on the wing-and he's a crack duck hunter. The former Wilmington man was, in fact, reminded of a fowl in flight when a Japanese aviator flew over him during the attack on Pearl Harbor December 7. So he grabbed a rifle, shot the pilot through the head and watched the plane crash. The army cited young Saltzman for gallant. ry in action. Writing about it in a letter received by his parents, the soldier expressed the hope that perhaps now the family would stop razzing him about his duck hunting. Said he: "It came in mightly handy."
