#### Indian Teacher **Kiwanis Speaker**

Ralph Poorman Explains Methods Used in Federal Schools

Kiwanis Club at Tuesday's lege.

Mr. Poorman is a former resident of Bellefonte and teacher in Centre County schools. He is now located at Fruitland, New Mexico, where he is in charge of the schools being conducted by the federal government for the Indian children of that vicinity, some of these children being transported a distance of thirty miles. He showed a number of rugs which they had woven, an art in which they are especially skilled, and explained the religious and tribal significance in the design. The Friday Indians raise sheep and horses and also grow many agricultural products, methods for the most part Bathurst, Blanchard being rather primitive.

A new system of education is being carried on, Mr. Poorman stated. Under the old system of boarding schools the pupils too often went through the schools, returned to the tribal dwellings, and lapsed back into the old life. The schools as now conducted are day schools. They are being taught methods of agriculture and other useful arts. This year they will work on the school farm all summer, learning the best methods of farm work. 
