Indian Teacher Kiwanis Speaker

Ralph Poorman Explains Methods Used in Federal Schools

Ralph Poorman gave an interesting address on the Navaho Indians of Arizona and New Mexico, which he illustrated with four-hundred feet of film, before the members of the Kiwanis Club at Tuesday's meeting.

A new system of education is being carried on, Mr. Poorman stated. Under the old system of boarding schools the pupils too often went through the schools, returned to the tribal dwellings, and lapsed back into the old life.

These Indians, the speaker said, have no written language of their own. One has been designed for them recently, but whether it will get any wide usage is problematical.

Fall of Clay Is Fatal To Miner

Clarence Peters Dies From Injuries Received While at Work

Injuries received Wednesday of last week when he was struck by a fall of clay at a mine operated by General Refractories on the Peters' farm near West Decatur, proved fatal to Clarence Peters, 50, of West Decatur.

He died early Saturday morning at the McGirk Sanatorium, Philadelphia, where he was rushed following the accident. His skull was fractured and his chest crushed by the fall.

Mr. Peters was born in West Decatur August 2, 1892. He was a son of J. Frank and Henrietta Peters. He is survived by his wife, Edith, and four children, Mrs. Jean Watson, Tyrone; and John, Robert and Marjorie, all at home. Mrs. Ursell, Kirtland, Mrs. James McGinley, Portage, and Charles Peters, Washington, D. C., are surviving sisters and brother.

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock from the West Decatur Methodist church.

Registrations Are Being Received

With the Primary election scheduled for May 19, the Centre County Commissioners yesterday called attention to the provisions of the voters' registration laws.

No person will be permitted to vote unless properly registered. Persons who have moved since registering must appear personally at the Commissioners' offices to have their addresses corrected.

Persons who have not voted during the past two years have received notice from the Commissioners that their names will be purged from the voters' lists unless they sign cards included with the purge notices and return them to the Commissioners' offices.
