over, plunging him into eight feet of ice-cold water with his skates on. A few moments after Wetmore dropped into the pond, Paul Tressler, of near Pennsylvania Furnace, also made an attempt to save the youth's life. Mrs. Wetmore, who was with her husband at the dam, upon seeing him in serious difficulty in the water, followed Tressler into the pond in an attempt to help him. Fred Metzger and Robert Overholt, State College youths, brought a boat and life preserver from nearby Metzger cabin and helped three of the group to safety. Wetmore and Williams were so chilled they were unable to take advantage of assistance extended.

Members of the Alpha Fire Company, with squad truck and pumper, were summoned to the scene about 3:45 o'clock and by grappling they located the bodies within a short time, but resuscitation efforts were not attempted since a physician certified that they were beyond aid.

After conducting an investigation into the double tragedy Monday morning, Centre County Coroner Charles Speckler, of Milesburg, decided that an inquest would not be necessary. He pronounced the deaths accidental.

Vernon A. Wetmore had been employed at the Penn State College Dairy for nearly 15 years and had been head of the cheese department for some years. He was a son of Austin and Charlotte Westbrook Wetmore, of Herrickville, Bradford county, and was born on January 3, 1908.

Surviving are his father and his wife, the former Medie Reeve, with whom he was united in marriage in August 1928. Also surviving are two children, Dolores, aged 11, and Charlotte, aged 9; a brother, Eldon, of Herrickville, and a half-brother, Wayne, also of Herrickville.

Wetmore was a member of the Wesleyan church and of State College F. and A. M. Lodge, No. 760. Funeral services were held Tuesday evening at the Koch Funeral Home, State College, with Rev. J. N. Fisher officiating. Interment was made at Herrickville.

Lewis Ray Williams was a son of Ralph E. and Minnie Leer Williams and was born on August 14, 1931. Surviving in addition to the parents residing at Warriors Mark, R. D., are these brothers and sisters, Harold, Floyd, Cloyd, Wilbur, Leon, John, Frank and Beatrice.

He was a member of the Dungarvin Methodist church, Warriors Mark, R. D. Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at the Dungarvin Methodist church, with the Rev. B. M. Shue officiating. Interment was made in the Port Matilda cemetery.

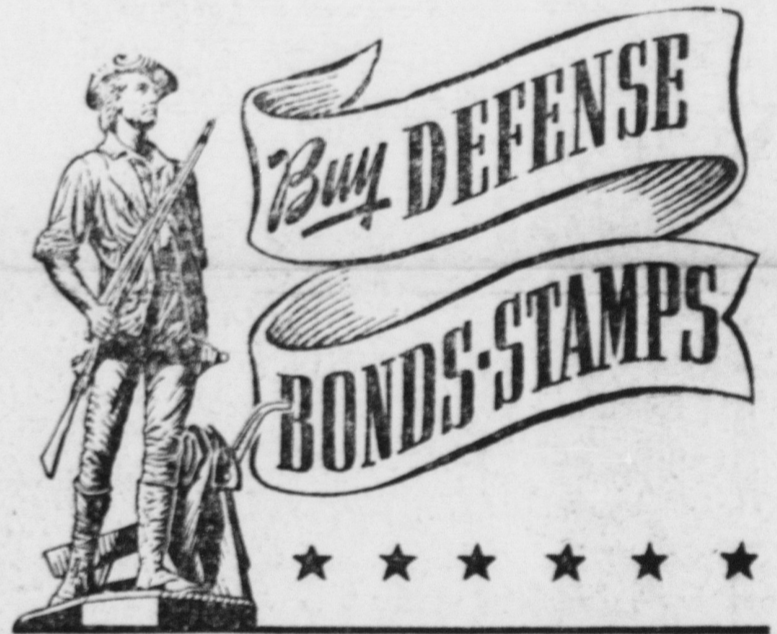
