SHINGLES
A common and painful disorder is shingles or herpes zoster. The disease looks like the fever blisters seen so frequently on the lips. In shingles there is a breaking out on the skin which follows a nerve.
You have all seen the backbones of animals, which are made up of bones called vertebrae. They are arranged in a column one above the other. Right through the center of each bone is a rounded hole through which passes one of the most delicate and important structures in the body. It is called the spinal cord and is composed of nerve tissue from which the spinal nerves arise. They find their way through the numerous openings between the vertebrae, and run out to supply the entire body. Each nerve gives off many branches which supply the muscles, the skin, and every structure in the body.
