## BASKETBALL TEAM CLIMBS TO FIRST PLACE

Coach Donald Rose's tiger cagemen jolted a powerful Gregg township quintet in a fiery match Tuesday night in the Spring Mills gym, winning by the slim margin of one basket, 24 to 22.

This victory places Centre Hall-Potter in a triangular tie with Gregg township and Snow Shoe for first spot in the league, each team having won six and lost two games.

Tuesday's score hedged from side to side through the game, Centre Hall leading 6 to 4 in the first frame, settling for a 12 to 12 tie at the half, submitting to a Spring Mills 22 to 20 lead at the end of the third quarter, and forging ahead in the last quarter.

High scorer for the match was Rossman from Spring Mills with ten points. Centre Hall's guard, Ralston, scored seven, making three for three at the foul line.

Others on Centre Hall-Potter's starting lineup, which played without substitution throughout, the game, were M. Fry and B. Moyer, forwards; J. Rimmey, center, and N. Rimmey, guard.

Gregg Township's starters were: Rossman and Watts, forwards; R. Houser, center; G. Houser and Krcut, guards.

Centre Hall's girls' team lost to Gregg Tuesday evening 29 to 17.

The teams will play here on Friday against East Penns Valley.

## DEFENSE PLANS SHOW ENCOURAGING PROGRESS

Defense work in Centre Hall received considerable impetus this week with the organization of several new units, according to Paul Breon, defense chairman. A public meeting was held in the high school building last evening to acquaint the community with plans for local activities.

Saturday, February 7, has been set as Civilian Defense Registration day. Men and women are needed for such duties as aircraft spotting, fire fighting, fire watching, emergency medical care, evacuation, demolition, etc.
