Flag Conscious Bellefonte Revives

Many service, patriotic, fraternal and civic organizations are showing increased interest in service flags—replicas of the ones which hung in honored places in lodges, clubs, and the meeting places of other organizations during the World War. These flags consist of a white field surrounded by a red border. In the field are attached blue stars for every member of the organization or group who is in the service of the armed forces of the United States. When one of them sacrifices his life for his country, the blue star is removed and a gold star is put in its place.

Several Bellefonte organizations now have service flags and many others are negotiating for flags of that type, Mr. Barnes reported.

One of the finest flags to be placed in Bellefonte for some time this week was delivered to St. John's Catholic church, Bellefonte, where it will occupy a place of honor on the altar. The flag is made of fine silk.

Among organizations which recently purchased flags are the Logan and Undine Fire Companies, the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, the Moose Lodge, County Commissioners, the Titan Metal Company and various departments of the plant and many other organizations. The Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars have purchased a number of flags for distribution among schools.

"A well known Bellefonte man, now deceased, bought a flag from me when we entered the first World War," Mr. Barnes reminisced. "He ran the flag up a flagpole in front of his home and declared: 'That flag's going to fly there day and

en teachers are engaged in Senior Red Cross work, while two others are aiding the Junior branch.

The faculty rolls have contributed one Deputy Air Raid Sector Warden, three Air Raid Wardens, six assistant Air Raid Wardens, one fire spotter, and four Air Raid Warden Instructors. The latter assignment entails approximately nine hours' activity per week.

Eight men and women of the staff spent an allotted time at the air raid warning device in the Central Control Station. Two others are assisting in plane spotting, while another is arranging all schedules of high school boys used in this branch of the defense program. Two women teachers are taking Home Nursing courses.

In activities not connected directly with national defense, six teachers are spending from one to four hours per week taking such extension courses as English, visual aid, typing and the like. Most of these persons spend some time in addition to their regular teaching in the defense program. Two men are engaged in instructing defense classes, while another member is taking a defense course.

At the same time the survey was made, 32 teachers were actively engaged in Defense work; others had volunteered but had not been assigned to any specific duty as yet.

Centre county's Air Raid Warning Service passed its first unexpected and unannounced raid test at 10:58 o'clock Sunday night, with flying colors, it was reported yesterday by Aaron D. Leitzell, chairman of the organization.

The alert was received and all departments of the county air raid units were on hand and ready for action in from 45 to ten minutes after the test warning was given. The county is divided into eight sectors and the test revealed that officers and members of every sector are familiar with their duties and are ready for action at a moment's notice, Mr. Leitzell said.

However, several minor obstacles remain to be worked out before the unit reaches the perfection necessary for a maximum of protection, Leitzell added.

released from their duties on Registration Day. Each teacher called is requested to bring a fountain pen.

No compensation will be paid for the services of these registrars and each will be required to sign an oath of office for faithful performance of duty and waiver of pay or compensation. No provision will be made for travel expense or meals; the checker registrars, like board members, are on their own, it was announced.

All unregistered men who were born on or after February 17, 1897 or on or after December 31, 1921, will be required to register.

Penalties for failure to obey the regulation are severe.
