Local Men Fought 40 Years

(Continued from page one) Of life on the Philippines Mr. Sunday's diary notes chiefly the heavy and almost incessant seasonal rain storms.

He lists the waters traveled on his round-the-world trip to the Philippines and return as follows: En route to the Islands the ship, the U.S.S. "Thomas" went east from New York, to eliminate the long journey around the southern tip of South America, since the Panama Canal was not then open.)

Atlantic Ocean, Strait of Gibraltar, Mediterranean Sea, Nile River, Suez Canal, Gulf of Suez, Bitter Lake, Red Sea, Gulf of Aden, Arabian Sea, Indian Ocean, Malacca Strait, China Sea, Sarsang Bay, Donsol Bay, Pillar Bay, Pacific Ocean and several smaller bodies of water. Oddly enough the same transport that took him to the islands brought him back to the U. S.

But in case you find a thrill of romance running through your veins at the mention of those Kipling-esque names, read these soldier's-eye excerpts of a description of the Philippines as given in Mr. Sunday's diary.

"The Philippine Islands are a large body of trouble gathered on the western horizon of civilization. They are bounded on the north by hoodoo-ism and smugglers; on the east by rocks and destruction; on the south by typhoons and monsoons, and on the west by cannibals and earthquakes.

"The climate is a deceptive combination well adapted to raising 'cane.' The principal exports of the islands are hemp, rice and war bulletins, the imports are American soldiers, arms and ammunition.

"The principal diet is fried rice, boiled rice, stewed rice, and rice with seasoned eyes, for before enlisting for the Insurrection he had served in the Spanish American War.

Several years after he returned from the Philippines he opened a tailoring shop in Bellefonte, and he's been engaged in that business constantly since that time. He is an active member of veterans' organizations and has held various offices in those groups.

No arm-chair general Mr. Sunday finds no fault with the conduct of the war in the Southwestern Pacific. "You don't know what's happening unless you're there," he said. "Big trouble with most of us is that we don't appreciate the tremendous distance involved in the present battlefield," he added.

Scouts Observe 32nd Anniversary

Local Troops to Conduct Public Program at School Tonight

From February 6 to 12 Boy Scouts all over the nation will celebrate the 32nd anniversary of the Scouting movement which was started February 8, 1910.

Bellefonte Troops 5 and 6 began the week on Sunday night by attending as a group the services held in the Reformed church at Bellefonte. About 45 Scouts and Scouters stood at attention and repeated the Scout oath. At the same time many other troops were following the same procedure throughout the country.

Thursday night the Boy Scouts will conduct a program in the Spring street gymnasium which will be of interest to all persons.

Immediately after assembling at 7:30, Jesse Caum will introduce the Scoutmaster of the evening who will then lead the Scouts in the Scout Oath and a few songs. After this the boys will demonstrate blackout first aid.

Next will be a signaling demonstration with Troop No. 2 of the Evangelical church, using the Morse System (dot-dash system). Troop No. 3 of the Logan Hose Co. will demonstrate the Semaphore Code (flag system). After presentation of awards the meeting will be closed by playing Taps and the Scoutmaster's Benediction.

flashlights, a fountain pen, an oil dispenser and cigars and candy, all valued at about \$46 was taken, it was reported. The robbery was the eleventh at the Heim station in the last several years.

Discovery of the robbery at the Bishop street school was made by a janitor, Saturday morning. Police who visited the scene said that apparently every desk in every classroom had been ransacked, but the only thing missing is small amounts of money kept in pupils' desks and elsewhere in the rooms. The total amount taken is believed to be less than \$10.

Authorities have been unable to determine how the thieves got into the school. One theory is that a member of the "gang" remained in the building when school closed on Friday, and that the doors locked automatically as the robbers completed their work and left the premises.

The third robbery—at the Federal Match Company offices on Phoenix avenue, took place sometime Saturday afternoon when C. H. Trovare, general manager and Charles W. visited the offices.

Nothing of value was taken but the offices showed evidences of having been ransacked. A check on which one of the robbers had begun to scrawl a name was found on a desk. Adding machines and typewriters had been operated inexpertly—apparently the work of youngsters unfamiliar with them.

While clues have been slight, police report that they are not without several factors which may bring a swift and decisive halt to the activities of the group.
